Sandy.

Harvest is progressing rapidly. Crops are medium. Threshing has begun.

Regardless of a drop in lumber the mills are running full blast, even then some can't fill all orders. Several new sawmill companies are looking for locations in this section, but timber is held so high that money almost can hardly buy it.

Archie Mason, contractor, has the contract to build the Mount Hood railroad. Work has commenced all along the line from Fairview to the Bull Run power house. About 500 men will be put to work at once. Heavy machinery is now being hauled across the Sandy.

Frank Beard rushed the season some, as he left for the hopfield last Sunday.

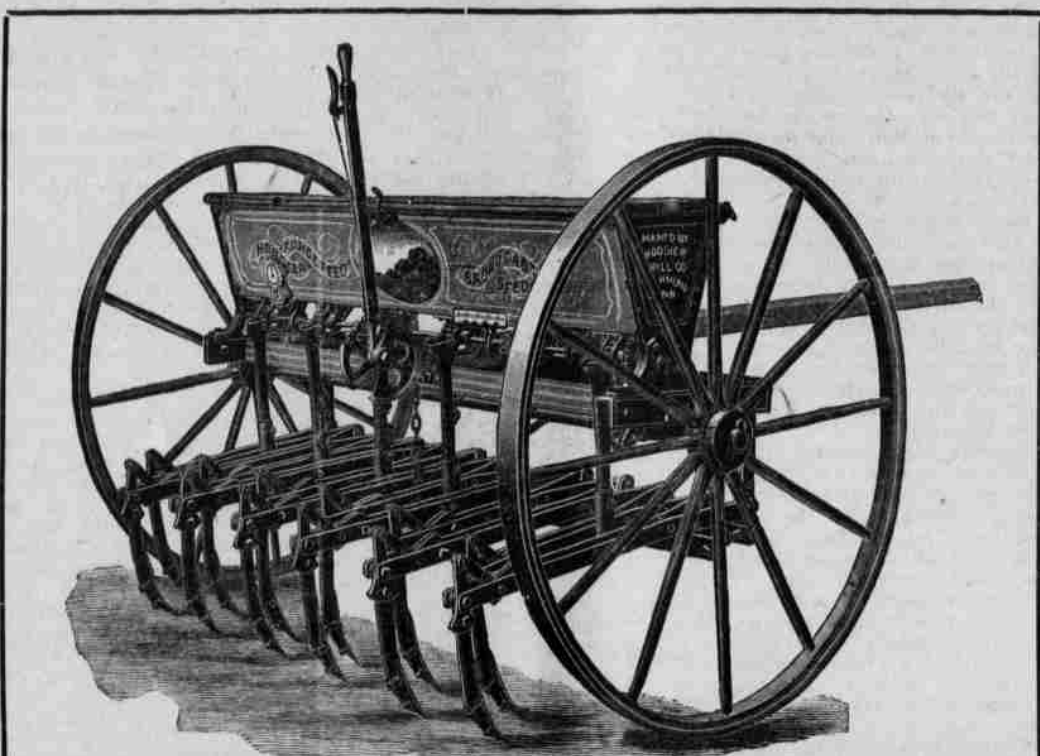
