

GALA DAY AT WILLAMETTE

Harvest Picnic Is Arranged For Next Monday.

TWO GOOD BALL GAMES

Speeches In the Morning, Races In the Afternoon, Music and Dancing All Day Long.

The town of Willamette will be the only place in Clackamas County to celebrate Labor Day and great festivities are being arranged for the occasion. Labor Day games next Monday and from early morning until late at night there will be music, feasting, games, oratory, sports and dancing in the lively little city above the Falls. In the morning there will be a ball game at 10:30 o'clock between the Oregon City Grays and the Willamette Mill Club and this contest promises to be a large number of fans from this city. In the last game between these teams the Grays won by a remarkably close score and the Willamette Mill Club is confident of winning next Monday's game.

O. P. Hoff, state commissioner of Labor, and Judge Gordon E. Hayes, will be the speakers and both will deliver interesting addresses. The Oregon City Band will furnish music all day and a dancing pavilion is being erected for the entertainment of the light-foot people in the afternoon and evening.

The beautiful grove on the bank of the Willamette River near the mouth of the Tualatin is well adapted for basket picnics and everybody and their wives and children and sweethearts are requested to bring their basket dinners along, though refreshments stands will be provided for the hungry and thirsty.

In the afternoon there will be races of various kinds, and the following programme has been arranged: Traveling Men's race, 75 yards, prize, rooster, donated by R. A. Jenkins; boys' race, under 14 years, 50 yards, prize, donated by W. T. E. Gary; girls' race, under 14 years, 50 yards, prize, donated by G. G. Graves; wheelbarrow race, 50 yards, prize, 24-inch center table, donated by Frank Busch; egg race, 25 yards, prize, shirt donated by Price Bros.; three-legged race, prize, donated by Price Bros.; five Store; business men's race, 75 yards, prize, hat donated by L. Adams; 100-yard dash, prize donated by Huntley Bros. Co.; ladies race, 50 yards, prize donated by Drs. Sommer and Mount; 100-yard dash, free for all, prize five pair of shoes donated by Capen Shoe Co.

Following the races there will be a baseball game between the Woodburn and St. John's teams of the Tri-City league, and this will bring many of the enthusiasts from the home towns of the players.

Featuring the transportation facilities will be entirely adequate to handle the expected crowds, and the steamer from Portland will stop coming and going. No liquor will be disposed of on the grounds. The union picnic of the Baptist Sunday School of Portland will be held at Willamette on Labor Day, and it is expected that 1000 Sunday school children will be present.

MOHLER DENIES CRUEL CHARGE

Blames Mazamas For Condition of His Horses.

STOOD TO LOSE MONEY

Edmund P. Sheldon and H. W. Gorman Insisted On Horses Going Into Hanging Valley.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 28.—(Editor of The Courier).—I hope you will give as much space and as big headline in your valuable paper this week to tell a little truth in answer to the article that appeared in The Courier of last issue.

I left Detroit for the base of Mount Jefferson July 10, arrived at Horse Heaven on the 12th and laid over there on the 13th with good horse feed, and went over to Hanging Valley and found the snow very deep with a good many bare spots, but the snow had not been gone long enough to let the grass start, and only last year's grass, and that very dry, so we decided that we could not get in the valley, and left the provisions at Horse Heaven and started for Detroit on the 14th, arriving there the evening of the 15th, where I had plenty of hay and oats for my horses.

When the Mazamas came on the 16th I told management the conditions and they decided to go in, arriving at Horse Heaven the evening of the 18th, and I did not want to take my horses any farther, but H. W. Gorman, a noted botanist, with Edmund P. Sheldon, and Rodney L. Gilson, went over in the valley, and Mr. Gorman went on to tell how rich the grass was and said that my horses would fatten up on it, and Sheldon said, "Mr. Mohler, we will take you to take us in Hanging Valley and in Hanging Valley we MUST GO!"

Well, my contract was two-thirds complete, and if I refused to go I could not get my pay, and I had put in about \$600, and could not afford to lose it. Well, when we got in the valley I gave my horses free range of the valley, which is about two miles wide and six long, and laid over their seven or eight days, and my horses fell off every day, with not a sore on their backs. We left Hanging Valley on the 28th, arriving at Detroit on the evening of the 29th, with some sores on my horses' backs, and left for home on the 29th and did not pack the horses with sore backs, which I can prove by L. J. Hicks, Dr. Kerr and John Nichols, who were with me all the way through. We took 11 days to come home and I never traveled over five hours any one day except the last day on August the 10th, when we traveled 26 or 27 miles in 14 hours, stopping on the road twice to feed the horses. I did not tell anybody that Mr. Hicks or Mr. Gilson were to blame, as Mr. Gilson did not say a word one way or the other. But Mr. Hicks did make a plea for my horses as well as myself, but to no avail.

Mr. Sheldon seemed to think my plea was to get out of work. I thought feed for my horses every chance and stand ready to prove it. There is not a kicker in the whole crowd that would kick if it hurt their pocket books one dollar. I did not do anything that I am ashamed of, and showed the horses to anybody that wished to see them. S. S. MOHLER.

STANDS BOLDLY UP FOR COUNTY

Fruit Inspector Lewis Takes Issue With Mr. Reid.

SURPRISED AT CENSURE

Has Found Many Homes and Farms in Clackamas That Would Be a Credit to Any Section.

MAPLE LANE, Or., Aug. 29.—(Editor of The Courier).—I was very much surprised at the communication of Commissioner Reid in the Sunday Oregonian of a week or so ago. It seems to me that friend Reid must have been suffering from an attack of acute indigestion, or some thing that affected his usual sunny disposition, and can hardly believe that he meant all that he asserted; it does not sound natural.

I want to say that I have been in almost all parts of Clackamas County in the last year, and that I have found many homes and farms that are a credit—not only to our county, but to any county in the state or to any state in the Union. The orchards of the county will agree with him, and not what they should be, but when I look at the work that has been done for their betterment in the last two years I feel that we should commend and not censure to harshly. Any one who has observed the difference in the orchards exposed for sale in Oregon City in the past two or three years, and that offered this season, I am sure cannot fail to see that much has been done in the right direction. There is room for much improvement. I grant you, but when I recognize the different success that has attended the efforts of some of our growers, I am supposed to be an expert, and have studied this matter, and have had the most approved machinery, and have spared no expense, I feel we should not be too hard on the average farmer for his partial failure. Much good work has been done, and it has been done with the best of feeling. I want to thank the grower and the grocer for their willingness to help carry out the law and make cleaner and better fruit. Much has been done and much more will be in the future.

As for the dairy cow, if we take the \$1800 one offered by friend Reid as a standard I will acknowledge we are against it, but nevertheless, I know there are many good cows in old Clackamas for all that and there will be more, never fear. And for beef steers, I think it would be hard to beat the record of Mr. Shaver, of Molalla, if reports are correct. I have personally know something of a number of different sections of the country and I am very sure that for intelligence and character the average farmer of Clackamas County need not be bash. I am not sure of all the best, but I think that within my life time nearly all these beautiful farms and homes were a howling wilderness, I am astounded and bewildered, and it seems to me somebody must have had some pluck and energy and could not have been disappointed. Let the good work go on, brothers. You have a right to be proud of what you have accomplished in the past, and the prospects are bright for your future. I am proud to sign myself a farmer and fruit-grower, though an humble one, of Clackamas County. A. J. LEWIS.
