ESTACADA BANK SUSPENDS.

Embarrassment Was Only Temporary And Institution Resumes.

The failure of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank of Portland was followed by the suspension of the Estacada State Bank, which closed its doors at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The bank's depositors residing in Estacada upon learning of the suspension of the Portland Institution made a run on the financial stronghold of Estacada and forced it to close its doors. An arrangement has been made between the officers of the bank and many of the depositors, whereby the latter agree to draw not more than 10 per cent of their deposits each month, which will allow the bank to get on its feet and do business.

The Estacada State Bank was organized nearly four years ago by R. A. Stratton, who was regarded as a safe, conservative business man, and is capitalized at \$20,000. The majority of its depositors are the people living in Estacada and the farmers of that section of Clackamas County.

About the first of this year Mr. Stratton sold his interest to the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank and went to Utah to take charge of an irrigation scheme. Since that time G. L. Fraley has been the cashier. The bank officers are: George Estes, president; Dr. Stryker, vice-president; G. L. Fraley, cashier.

The run was made Wednesday without warning and was the cause of no little excitement in Estacada. About \$3000 was drawn out and while the institution had ample funds to meet the demands of ordinary business, it was in no position to stand an unexpected assault. The Bank of Estacada, which is owned by W. A. Heylman, was not affected by the upheaval.

DIMICK ISSUES INJUNCTION.

Mr. Nickell Not Permitted to Cut Timber While Contest is Pending.

County Judge Dimick has rendered a decision issuing an injunction against the defendant in the suit of George W. Yergen vs. Garrison P. Nickell. Yergen sued Nickell to restrain the latter from cutting the timber from lot 4, section 27, township 3 south, range 1 west, which was homesteaded by Nickell, but Yergen filed a contest that is now pending, and alleges that Nickell is attempting to remove the land of the timber, having installed a sawmill outfit. Nickell stated that the land is covered with a growth of small trees, wholly unsuitable and unfit for merchantable timber, and he removed some of the timber from time to time for the purpose of clearing the land, and erecting the necessary fences and buildings, selling only the surplus timber. Judge Dimick's opinion states that the contest of Yergen is valid and that so long as a controversy exists he cannot do other than issue the injunction restraining Nickell from cutting the timber.

FINDS A METEOR.

Frank Griffith Picks up Mass of Molten Iron.

Frank Griffith Friday picked up a meteoric substance on the west side of the river, about 150 yards below the residence of B. J. Daulton, and within 20 feet of the waterfaring trough and not more than three feet from the road. The metal is best shaped and about six inches across at the base, tapering up to two inches at the top. It contains nickel and about 90 per

cent iron. The metal had been entirely covered, but the rains had probably washed off the surface of the earth so that the top of the meteor was visible. Mr. Griffith has the piece on exhibition at Stewart's place, corner of Main and Fourth streets.

TROUBLES COME THICKLY.

Albert A. Alderman Forced to Leave Town and Wife Wants Divorce.

Albert A. Alderman, of Salem, was escorted out of town Saturday by officers Cooke and Shaw and just before the departure of his train he was served with a summons in a divorce suit filed by Anna J. Alderman. The unhappy pair were married in Salem July 23, 1903, and the plaintiff alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, stating that in December, 1905, her husband became violently angry, threw her around and tore nearly all of her clothes off, and at other times he violently assaulted and choked her. Mrs. Alderman, whose maiden name was Anna J. Wheeler, left her husband July 10, and a short time ago came to Oregon City. Alderman arrived here Thursday and spent the night with his wife in the Electric Hotel. Next day she refused to see him, and the angry man went to the house at Twelfth and Jackson streets, where she was staying and threatened to kill her. He was promptly arrested by the police and landed in the city jail, where he remained until sent from town.

Practical Value of Collie Dogs.

One of the features of the Scotch Collie exhibit at the Greater Oregon State Fair (Sept. 16-21), at Salem, will be practical demonstrations of the value of these dogs in sheep herding. A prize will be given to the best trained Collie, to be shown at work with a band of sheep on the grounds. This contest should prove interesting to all lovers of dogs, since the sagacity and intelligence of the Collie is shown to the highest degree in the management of a number of sheep. Similar exhibitions are great events in the hills and sheep-raising districts of Scotland.
