

NEW METHOD OF CARRYING MAIL

Automobile May Be Used By Rural Carrier.

TEST MADE LAST SUNDAY

Frank Whiteman Runs Buckboard Machine Over 27 Miles of Road in Four Hours.

Frank Whiteman, carrier on Oregon City rural free delivery route No. 2, has a novel project on hand in the form of delivering with an automobile, and the experiment will be watched with interest by other carriers. The auto is constructed on the buckboard plan, but is not built for speed, though capable of making better time than a team of horses. Hay and other horse feed has gone up to a point where the price is beyond the reach of the ordinary individual, and if the machine is successful in handling the mail business with dispatch, Mr. Whiteman expects to effect a considerable saving in the cost of gasoline over hay. The machine is of standard manufacture and the makers are confident that it will stand the test.

The experimental test was quite successful Sunday, and Whiteman made the trip over the route, covering a distance of 26 miles, in four hours. His usual time with a team and wagon is eight hours. It is not generally believed, however, that the machine will prove a success in running over muddy roads, as the horsepower is not sufficient.
