REGULAR DRILL TO BE RESUMED

Oregon National Guard Ready
For Winter Work.

RIFLE RANGE OBTAINED

Company G Will Maintain the
Fine Record Made at Sea-
side During the State
Encampment.

The weekly drills of Co. G, Third Regiment of Infantry, Oregon National Guard, will be resumed next Monday night, commencing at 8 o'clock, and the members of the company are looking forward eagerly to the coming winter's work. The quarterly inspection will take place about the last of this month, probably September 30. This inspection is required by law, and all members of the organization must be in attendance at an average of 80 per cent. of the strength must be present. The object of the officers and men of Company G is to make it one of the best, if not the best, in the State, and in order to accomplish this, every man must be present at every drill promptly.

Captain Franklin A. Loomis, Lieutenant Logus and Burns have been scouting for several weeks, trying to locate a rifle range of 1,000 yards, and they have found a suitable place near Willamette. Just as soon as arrangements are made for shooting in this range the State will make an appropriation to fit up the range. This will be one of the few 1,000-yard ranges in the State, and Company G will stand a better chance of making the team that will go East next year than most of the other infantry companies in Oregon.

Captain Loomis said today that the company will have an indoor-shooting cabinet in the Armory, and small calibre rifles and small charges of powder will be used, reducing a 200-yard range to 90 feet. This is effected by the arrangement of charges in the cabinet. Plenty of ammunition will be furnished, so that the men may shoot as much as they please. Every man is required by law to do a certain amount of target shooting each year, and when a man qualifies in rifle practice he is put on the team that goes East, and on this trip he is furnished his regular pay, transportation and rations from the time he leaves home until the day of his return.

There are a few more vacancies in the company's ranks which will be likely to be filled before the last of September, as it is the desire of the officers to have a full complement of men for the winter. Company G made an enviable record during the State encampment at Seaside, and every man is expected to work his hardest and to do his best to retain that record. Captain Loomis says:

"Unless we have the individual support of each man, it will not be possible to do this. The idea to be emphasized is that the whole company is no more efficient than the weakest man in it."

GETS NEARER TO SOLUTION

The Statement No. 1 agreement with us exactly as it is written in our law. That we, the people of the State of Oregon, further instruct each and every one of our Representatives and Senators in our Legislative Assembly, now and hereafter, to vote always in that body for that candidate for United States Senator in Congress whom we have selected at our general election; and that, as our officers, you are not to have any more responsibility in obeying our instructions for the formal election and ratification of our selection and choice for our United States Senator in Congress than you have for the formal ratification of our selection and choice for our Governor of Oregon.

Mr. U'Ren made the following statement: "The reasons for and against Statement No. 1, and for making a mere office people, the supreme power in the State, can thus be fully placed before the voters through the press and on the stump, as well as in the pamphlet copy of the bills to be voted on next year. In this way the question may be argued by both sides and decided by the voters comparatively free from personal bitterness and party prejudice. If the plan meets with general approval it will be possible to obtain the necessary signatures for the initiative petition.

"A candidate for the legislature can hardly refuse to file his statement promising the people of Oregon to vote for their choice for United States Senator in Congress if this bill is approved, and to use his own pleasure if it is rejected. The politicians who are so conscientious that they cannot do this, might refuse to be candidates for this one time. These very conscientious politicians of public morals will have plenty to do for one campaign, without running for office, if they convince the voters:

"First, that it is morally right that the candidate who will pay the highest price to the members of the Legislature shall be elected United States Senator by that body, as in former years, instead of the candidate selected by the voters of the people, and who makes neither payments of cash nor promises of office to the conscientious legislators.

"Second, that it is morally wrong for a candidate for the Legislature to pledge his honor to the people of Oregon that he will obey their instructions,

when by their constitution they have expressly reserved the right to instruct their representatives.

Third, that it is morally wrong for a candidate for the Legislature to sign the Statement No. 1 agreement with the people of Oregon.

"After such a campaign of education added to the experience Oregon had with the results of Statement No. 1 in the last election, as compared with the hold-ups of other years, every man should be able to vote intelligently on this bill. If the majority vote against it we shall all know that the people of Oregon want to be servants of their officers and political parties. But if the bill is approved by majority vote, then even the most conscientious politicians will understand that the people intend to be master and hold the political parties as their servants, just as Lincoln and Roosevelt have always said."

WOMAN ON THE BOARD.

Mrs. Lucia Faxon Addison Will Help to Govern Chautauqua.

The gallantry of the stockholders of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Assembly was not appealed to in vain Monday and the plea of Mrs. Lucia Faxon Addison, of Portland, asking that a woman or several women be given places on the directorate, was answered by the election of Mrs. Addison herself, and she goes on the Chautauqua board of directors in place of State Treasurer George A. Steel, who has been prominent in Chautauqua affairs for many years. Mrs. Addison is state president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and has always taken an active interest in the sessions at Gladstone Park. The other directors who were re-elected were H. E. Cross, John T. Apperson, George A. Harding, Charles B. Moore, A. P. Parker, W. C. Hawley, W. A. Huntley, S. G. Reed, Charles H. Dye, J. E. Hedges.

The board of directors, who will meet in October for the annual election of officers, were directed to appoint not less than 20 vice-presidents from the sections of the state interested in the Willamette Valley Chautauqua, with the object of promoting interest. These vice-presidents will come from Portland, Salem, Albany, McMinnville, Forest Grove, Astoria, Hillsboro, Gresham and dozens of other valley towns.

The annual reports of Secretary H. E. Cross and Treasurer E. G. Canfield were received and show that the receipts from this year's session were \$7,692.27, and the disbursements to date \$7,271.39, leaving a balance of \$420.88. There is due, however, on the debt of the old corporation about \$500 and approximately the same amount is due the Chautauqua on unpaid stock subscriptions, and when these matters are finally adjusted it is likely that there will be a surplus on hand for next year's work of about \$400. Three of the principal items of expenditure in connection with the recent assembly were \$1,171.75 for platform talent, \$428.50 for baseball, and \$187.38 for music. The expense of publicity was about \$700.

Suits in Justice Court.

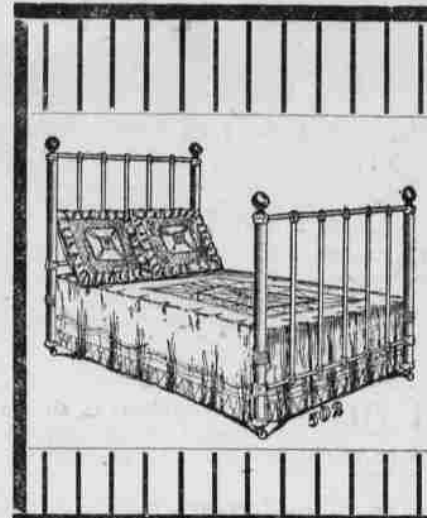

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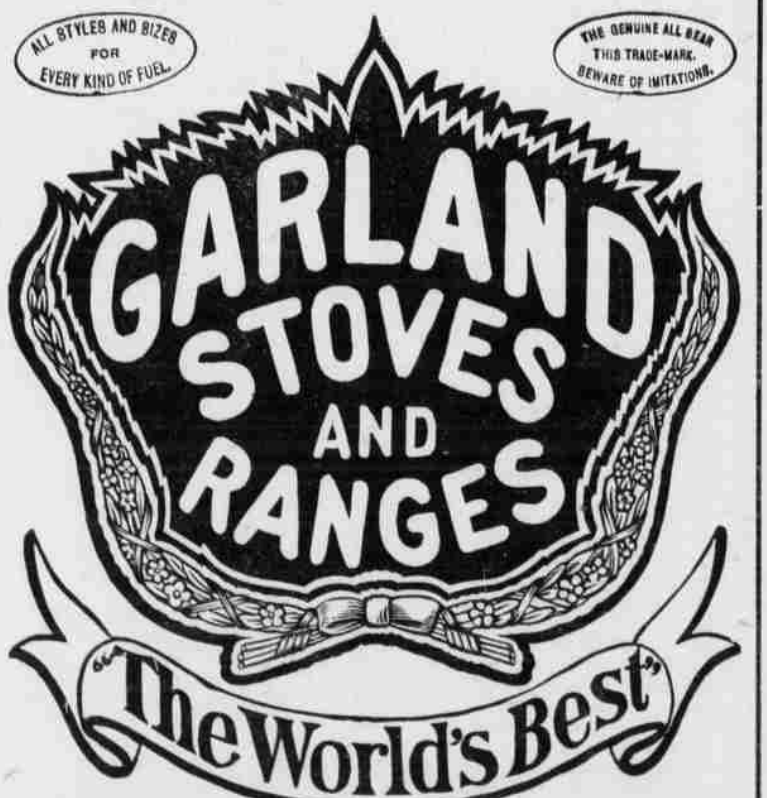


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
