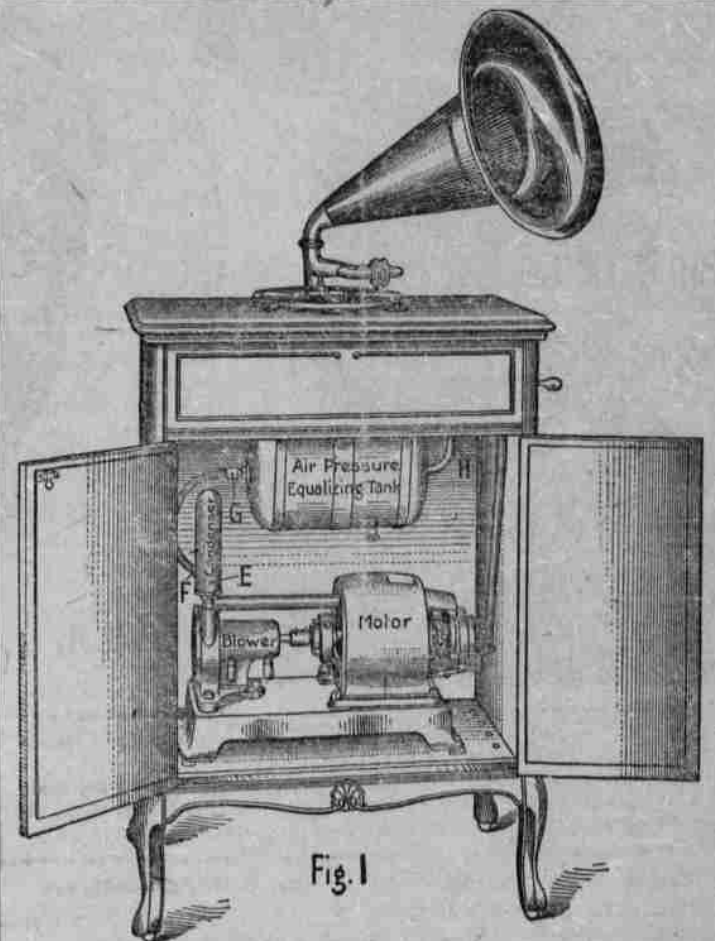

POTATOES TAKE A DROP

Large Shipments of Fruit Brought in
For Holiday Consumption—Eggs
Do Not Decline and Sell
For 40 Cents the Dozen.

Owing to the present stringent times, the turkey market during the week is somewhat dull. The wholesale price paid is from 15 cents to 17 cents per pound, and the retail price from 18 to 23 cents per pound. The price of dressed chickens is 15 cents per pound. Dressed chickens were selling at 13 cents per pound, and there was a demand for same at that price. The turkeys and chickens were in unusual good condition this year.

The onion and potato market is dull throughout the state. The San Francisco demand has fallen off considerably, although some of the Oregon growers are shipping some of their products north and south. Potatoes have dropped in price from 80 to 70 cents, wholesale, while some are bringing 75 cents wholesale.

During the present week the fruit market is good, and large shipments of apples and pears have been brought in, and the merchants can easily supply the large demand of fruit for Thanksgiving consumption. The apples that were brought in this week were of good varieties, among them being the Spitzenberg and Northern Spy. There is always a big demand for these two varieties at this time of the year, which are retailing at \$1.10 to \$1.45 per box. Judge Dimick, who spent Saturday at George, brought back with him several fine specimens of Northern Spy apples, that are famous for their size and flavor. George is an exceptionally fine fruit country and the growers of that section are making plans for a unanimous work next season. Improved methods will be adopted and apples will be shipped until inspected and approved by the association. This year the apples were not sprayed or cared for at all, yet the trees netted \$5 each to their owners.

Farmers throughout the county have been busy for the past three weeks ploughing and fall seeding, but owing to the heavy downpour of rain, it will hinder those who have not yet completed their work. A great deal of wheat all over the country will be sown this year. A great many of the farmers are sowing timothy seed with their fall grain, going back to the old standby for horses. There is plenty of grass for cattle grazing, the late frosts having done no damage. The grape season has about ended, although a few are to be found in the markets.

Ranch eggs are still high, and are retailing at 40 cents per dozen. The merchants have a supply of Eastern eggs, but there is more demand for fresh ranch eggs even at a higher figure.

Butter remains the same as that of last week; ranch 60 cents, creamery 65 cents. Casals and watermelons are still in the local markets, something un-

usual for this time of the year, and the fruit are still of delicious flavor. Peaches are being brought in to the market also, the Ashland peaches being bringing a price of 20c per dozen. The grape season has about come to an end, although a few are to be found in the local market. California grapes are now received by the local merchants.

In the livestock market the price of cows has gone to \$2.25 and \$2.75; bogs have gone down considerably to \$5.50/\$5.75. The prices paid last week for same were \$6.00 and \$6.50. The hog market is unusually dull for this time of the year, and a number of the farmers will hold until better prices.

During the past week the price of mill stuffs has taken a considerable raise and the prices that are being paid for same by C. F. Buckles, the commission merchant, are as follows: Bran, \$21.50; middlings, \$23.00; shorts, \$25.00; dairy chop, \$21.50/\$22.00. The prices of flour and hay remain the same as that of last week.

GREAT DAIRY CONVENTION.

Butter and Cheese Ask Apple and Pear to Sidelstep.

"Please side step and give me the center of the stage," says the dairyman to the fruit grower, and continuing, the producer of butter and cheese has this to say: "We are all proud of Oregon's apples and pears. Glad you got the use of the great show windows in which to present yourselves to the admiring thousands, but you only come once a year, while we add a little to the wealth of Oregon every day of the three hundred and sixty-five."

"Oregon fruit's five-million dollar yield for 1907 is great, but Oregon's dairy product, growing from nothing ten years ago to five millions in 1902, and seventeen millions in 1907, is going to give a grand entertainment in Portland December 12th and 13th."

"Two floors of the big Woodmen's Hall at 11th and Alder have been engaged for that purpose, one for the exhibits and the other for the convention. The prizes offered are the greatest ever presented in the West. The program will be excellent. There will be a reception, with refreshments and music, at the Portland Commercial Club the evening of the 12th. "It is the farmer and the dairyman who should be present at this con-

vention. All of the commercial bodies should have delegates present, and as the women of Oregon have made the state famous for its dairy products they will be especially welcome and some of the best papers on the program will be delivered by women. "The exercises will open promptly at 10 o'clock Thursday morning, December 12th, at Woodmen's Hall. Each and every paper will be discussed so that the practical points may be brought out. All delegates are urged to be present, however, an hour before the opening Thursday so as to register, receive badges, and get time to examine the exhibit in the large room just below the convention hall. "The officers of the Oregon Dairy Association want you to come prepared to ask questions, to feel that you are present to be benefited, and to appreciate that the discussion of the papers after they are delivered is more valuable than the papers themselves, for this character of discussion brings out all the strong points. "The business men of Portland have put up money to insure the publication of the proceeding in the best possible manner, and to illustrate the same, but only facts and vital information will be printed, and these are wanted from every district in Oregon. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third from every point in the state."
