FEED SALMON UNTIL SUMMER Important Change In Method of Caring For Fish By Government.

in the methods employed in feeding before liberation from the hatcheries, according to Henry O'Malley, superintendent of the United States Bureau of Fisheries, in charge of the work of propagation in Oregon and Washing-

"The Bureau of Fisheries," said Mr. O'Malley, "is going to change its methods, as far as hatchery room will permit, in the liberation of young salmon from each one of its seven sub-stations in Oregon and Washington. We are going to feed from 5, 000,000 to 10,000,000 young salmon until they have attained a size of from four to five inches in length. will then be liberated in the tributaries of the Columbia River, and the same method will also be followed on the Rogue River in Southern
