ORDINANCE NO. . .

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Recorder to transfer certain real property South of Block 29 in Exchange for power plant.

That whereas the Board of Water Commissioners of Oregon City has entered into an agreement with the Hawley Pulp and Paper Company for an exchange of certain properties where by the city is to acquire a site for its pumping station and additional ground on Main Street in exchange for certain properties lying in the rear of the present filter plant, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED,

That the Mayor and Recorder on behalf of the city are authorized and directed to execute and deliver to said Hawley Pulp and Paper Company a deed of conveyance of all right, title and interest of the City of Oregon City in and to that certain real property described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the Southernly line of Block 29 in Oregon City, Oregon, and a line parallel with the Easterly line of Main Street, and 73.3 feet Easterly therefrom and running thence Southerly parallel with the Easterly line of Main Street 72 1/2 feet to the Southerly side of the foundation of the present filter building; thence Westerly along the Southerly line of the foundation of said filter building 18.3 feet to a point; thence Southerly on a line parallel with the Easterly line of Main Street 10 feet; thence Easterly on a line parallel with the Southerly line of said Block 29 to the Southeast corner of said tract belonging to the city; thence Northeasterly along the Easterly line of said tract to the intersection of the Southerly line of said Block 29; thence Westerly on the Southerly line of said Block 29 to the place of beginning.

The said conveyance and transfer to be made upon the compliance of the said Hawley Pulp and Paper Company with the terms of the agreement entered into by and between said company and the said Board of Water Commissioners of Oregon City and when satisfactory to said Board of Water Commissioners of Oregon City.

An electric furnace has also been installed for the baking of porcelain inlays, and other new and up-to-date dental fixtures have been installed in the office rooms. Dr. Beatie has purchased a dental chair, the first of its kind turned out by the manufacturers in Rochester, N. Y. The chair is a model and is the only one of its kind that has been shipped West. The chair is of white enamel, and upholstered in tan pigskin, having a combination seat that will readily accommodate a person of unusual proportions or the merest little tot that calls to receive the careful attention of the dentist. The reception room, which fronts Main street, is elegantly furnished in mission, and presents a very attractive appearance.

Dr. Beatie is to have associated with him, Dr. Clyde Mount, brother of Dr. Hugh S. Mount, of this city, and who is present in Wallawa county, where he has been practicing for the past two years, and will arrive in Oregon City the first of next week. Dr. Mount comes to Oregon City highly recommended, having graduated from the North Pacific Dental College in 1905, and has had a great deal of experience in dentistry in Silverton and Wallawa.

ORDINANCE NO. . .

An Ordinance granting right to Hawley Pulp and Paper Company to build switches and tracks from O. W. P. & Ry. Co. railway track to its properties in South end of the City.

Oregon City does ordain as follows: That permission and right is hereby granted unto the HAWLEY PULP AND PAPER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, to construct and maintain, during the life of the present franchise of the Oregon Water Power and Railway Company, switches, turn-outs and curves at or near the railway tracks, with suitable foundations therefor, over the road and streets leading from said Oregon Water Power and Railway Company's main lines in Oregon City, into and upon the properties of the said Hawley Pulp and Paper Company, and to run cars over the same as follows:

First, Beginning at a point on Third Street, 71 feet Westerly from the Westerly side line of Main Street; thence running from the main track of the O. W. P. & Ry. Co.'s tracks by a curve to within 24 feet of the Southerly line of Lot 5, Block 2 thence Westerly to the Willamette River; also beginning at a point in the Westerly main track of said O. W. P. & Ry. Co.'s road on Main Street 25 feet South from a point opposite the center line of the alley running through Block 29, thence running Southeasterly by a curve to Lot 5 of said Block 29; also beginning 34 feet South of the South line of the concrete wall at the Northerly end of the Basin, thence running from the said Company's main track on a curve Northeasterly to the property of the said H. P. & P. Co. immediately North of said Basin also beginning at a point 114 feet South of the said concrete wall of said Basin, thence running Northeasterly from said Main track on a curve to the property of said H. P. & P. Co. immediately North of said concrete wall also beginning at a point 120 feet South of the said concrete wall and running thence Southwesterly to the aforesaid Basin.

Provided, however, that the said Company shall not be permitted to allow cars to stand on said track so as to obstruct or unnecessarily interfere with travel or traffic on said road or streets, and in each case said Company shall preserve the surface of said street and road in the proper condition, conformable to the established grades and pavements. This permit may be forfeited whenever the said Grantee, its successors or assigns, shall fail to comply with the aforesaid conditions.
