Farmers Recent Coercion.

At a recent meeting of representative farmers of Washington township, Marion county, Indiana, the following resolutions were adopted, and it was also agreed to form an endless chain among the farmers of the country.

"Resolved, That as farmers who have the good of our country at heart, we deeply deplore such unwarranted statements and believing they are made for partisan purposes to intimidate and influence voters, we herewith denounce all firms making this and similar announcements, as narrow and bigoted, and in those times as disloyal to the best business interests of the nation...

"Resolved, That we hereby call upon the farmers of the nation, irrespective of party, who believe in fair play, unite with us through their organization and as individuals, in crushing out this unwise and indiscreet spirit which would sacrifice the country's welfare for party success."

With few exceptions, the numerous straw votes being taken throughout the country, show that the laboring vote is largely with Bryan and Kern. UGLY COERCION.

Mr. P. M. Sharples, president of a West Chester, Pa., factory, which employs 100 men, has posted a placard about his plant announcing that should the "dire calamity" of Mr. Bryan's election befall the country, in that hour these works will have to close down.

Difficult as it is to draw the line for the purposes of the court, between legitimate notice concerning present and future trade and deliberate use of force, it would seem that this case is reasonably clear. Mr. Sharples scorns to take refuge behind ambiguous words. He frankly threatens, "Unless you beat Bryan," he says, "you lose your jobs."

This sort of bribery is more dangerous than any other. It is a subtle and insidious thing, because it is subtler and harder to exterminate. The Democratic party and Mr. Bryan have suffered heavily from it in other campaigns. As a weapon of political warfare it is peculiarly unfair and contemptible.
