Oregon Society Sons of American Revolution.

The Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution offers prizes to the pupils of the public schools of the state of Oregon for essays on subjects connected with our war for independence.

Prizes of \$20 and \$10 will be awarded for the first and second best essays written by high school pupils on either one of the following subjects: "Foreign Aid in the Revolutionary War," "Washington's Greatness—In what Did It Consist?"

Prizes of \$20 and \$10 and three of \$5 each will be awarded for the first, second, third, fourth and fifth best essays, respectively, written by grade pupils on any one of the following subjects: "The Causes of the Revolutionary War," "The Battle of Saratoga," "The Navy in the Revolutionary War," "The Battle of Bunker Hill."

The essays are limited to three thousand words each, must be written in the student's own handwriting on one side only of the paper, and accompanied by a certificate from the writer's teacher, stating that the writer is a pupil in a designated class, and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work. The essays must be signed by the writer, giving also his or her postoffice address. They should be forwarded to Mr. B. A. Thaxter, Chairman of Committee, 44 Eleventh street, Portland, Oregon, and should reach their destination not later than January 31, 1909.

In awarding these prizes the committee will be governed by considerations of originality, accuracy of statement, manner of treatment, orthography, syntax and punctuation, neatness and legibility.
