### DEATH OF FORMER RESIDENT

J. B. David Passed Away in Portland Thursday.—Buried Here Sunday

J. B. David, a former resident of this city, passed away last Thursday in Portland. He was well known to the early settlers of this city, coming here shortly after the close of the Civil War, during which he served four years in the Union army. For some time he engaged in railroad surveying, and finished several large contracts for the Union Pacific. Later he moved to Portland, where by his industry and thrift he built himself up a good business, and amassed a considerable fortune. Mr. David is survived by a wife and five children, all of whom are grown. The funeral services were held in this city Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, under the auspices of Multnomah Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of which he was a member. The services were conducted by Worshipful Master E. P. Rands.
