The western phosphate lands recently withdrawn from entry by the secretary of the interior in accordance with the president's order comprise portions of Morgan, Rich, and Cache counties in Utah; portions of Bear Lake, Bannock, Bingham, and Fremont counties in Idaho; and nearly all of Uinta County in Wyoming—all about 7,500 square miles of land more or less underlain by phosphate rock and constituting the greatest known phosphate deposit in the world.
