DEATH OF MRS. HENRY

Sister of Mrs. Haniff Passed Away Saturday Night

Mrs. Margaret Henry, for the past nine years a resident of this city, died at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night at the residence of her sister, Mrs. Herbert Haniff, at 514 Fourteenth street, near Washington. For some time Mrs. Henry was afflicted with a cancer, and last July, underwent an operation at St. Vincent's hospital in the hope of allaying the trouble. For a while she appeared to have been greatly benefited by the operation, but during the month of October, it was found that complications had set in, and from that time till her demise, she faded steadily.

Mrs. Henry was a native of Ireland, being born in Kilgort, Kerry county, September 2, 1813. While yet a young girl, her family crossed the Atlantic, and settled at Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, where deceased lived for 50 years. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Herbert Haniff of this city, and Mrs. Catherine Murphy of Chicago; and three brothers, J. and D. Foley of Ontario, and T. J. Foley of Chicago. The funeral services were held at three o'clock Tuesday afternoon at St. John's Catholic church, being conducted by Rev. A. Hildebrand, after which the remains were brought to the Southern Pacific depot, from whence they were shipped in charge of Herbert Haniff to Ontario, where they will be interred beside those of her parents and husband.

MRS. REBECCA CLARK DEAD

Well Known Resident of Mt Pleasant Succumbs to Consumption

After suffering for several months with an attack of consumption, Mrs. Rebecca C. Clark, well known in Oregon City, died Tuesday night at the residence of her husband, T. Gilbert Clark, in Mount Pleasant. Mrs. Clark was a native of Sweden, born there March 27, 1863. While a girl her family moved to Iowa, and there Mrs. Clark received her education. For several years after she had finished school, she taught with the greatest success in the schools of that state. July 9, 1889, she was married to Mr. Clark in Dakota, and they made their home in that section till 1890, when they moved to Oregon City and have since resided in Mt Pleasant. Besides her husband, Mrs. Clark is survived by her mother.

The funeral services were held Thursday afternoon in the chapel of the Seelwood crematorium, being conducted by Rev. B. C. Blackwell, pastor of the Methodist church, of which deceased was a devoted member. After the services, the remains underwent the process of cremation.

Assumption Man Knows Shannon

In a recent communication to Mr. H. L. Kelley of this city, who has had something to say in previous issues of the Courier about the Evangelical Dan Shannon, Rev. Chas. R. L. Vawter, of Assumption, Ill., asks many questions of interesting information in reference to his work. Rev. Vawter, it appears was pastor of the Christian Church at Assumption, Ill., at the time Shannon was at work there, and he says:

1st. "I bear record to the truth of your words regarding his irreverence." 2nd. "I was in the union meeting one week, and was there forced to leave or endorse his irreverence and unscriptural practices, and also his assumption upon my faith. He held up to ridicule the short comings of church members of other churches, but he ridiculed the faith of my people, and of the Catholics, and said they were damnable. But enough."

3rd. "Shannon lies when he says he got 235 converts here in 3 weeks, or to 300 weeks for that matter, he was here 3 weeks and three or four days. How many converts I do not know. Of the FIFTEEN cars turned over to the Christian church, the majority were forgeries, people who never asked for a prayer, nor held up a hand, nor did anything, were listed as converts, and were ignorant of the signing of their names. Can I prove this? IN ANY COURT."

4th. "The churches most benefitted were the ones he fought."

5th. "Shannon never converted a saloon keeper here in 3 weeks, or stated in the Oregon City Courier, of Oct. 9th. There is not, and has not been a saloon there in a good while. The town was dry long before Shannon ever went there."
