Former Clackamas County Man Writes of Grant County

Monument, Ore., Jan. 17, 1909.

Editor Oregon City Courier: Having read in your valuable paper of the weather conditions in the valley, if you will allow me a little space I will let my old Clackamas county friends know what we have just experienced in Northern Grant County. First I will state where I am. I am located on a homestead five miles northwest of the little town of Monument, which is on the north fork of the John Day river in Grant County, which is a very rough mountainous country.

We had a great deal of freezing weather through December, but no snow to speak of until the first week in January, when it began snowing in good shape and continued until we had four inches of the beautiful. Then it cleared up and turned cold for three days and nights the thermometer registered from 15 to 25 degrees below zero.

This is the fifty-sixth winter I have spent in Oregon and this is the coldest weather I ever experienced. At the present time we are having a genuine Chinook and the snow is fast disappearing, a thing we are very glad to see, as such weather is very hard on stock and the haystacks are melting away like snow before the noonday sun.

I see by the label on my paper that my subscription has expired, so I have just renewed for another year. I have just recently passed the sixty-ninth mile post on my journey through life and am thankful that at this age I am still able to watch my chances and foot it down into the John Day canyon to Monument and home again the same day.

We have a literary society that meets every Saturday night at our school house and have a jolly good time. Our school is being taught by a young lady named Secrest from near Portland, and having good success. Our school did not close on account of the extremely cold weather, and the little boys and girls weaned their way through the snow and zero weather and appeared to enjoy it.

Well, I will close for this time, and if this does not find its way to the waste basket I may come again. Wishing all of my old friends health and prosperity, I subscribe myself yours as ever, W. F. KIRK.
