Washington, Feb. 15 .- As soon as President-elect Taft finds a suitable man for secretary of war his cabinet will be complete; that is, tentatively complete. It will be subject to change any time before the 4th of March, if conditions arise which, in the opinion of Mr. Taft, justify mod-

But it can be said on the authority of one of Mr. Taft's closest advisers that eight of the nine cabinet officers have been conditionally chosen, and seven out of the eight have signified their willingness to enter the cabinet if the formal tender is made

them. They are: Secretary of state-Philander C. Knox, Pennsylvania. Secretary of treasury-George M. Reynolds, Illinois.
