MAKE PAPER FROM STUMPS

Coos Bay People Are Investigating
Method of Using Waste Material

The manufacture of paper pulp from
the wood of the fir tree and waste prod-
ucts of sawmills will be attempted
at Coos Bay. Spruce is chiefly used
for making paper pulp, but a new
chemical discovery will be employed
to make possible the use of fir.

The chemical discovery was made
by Dr. George B. Frankforter, a pro-
fessor in the University of Minnesota,
and the experiment will be backed by
C. A. Smith of Minneapolis. Dr.
Frankforter is expected here in about
a month, when an experimental plant
will be established.

The invention is a process of distil-
lation by means of chemicals which
removes from the fir wood those prop-
erties which now make it impossible
for wood pulp. There will also be a
number of by products, among them
alcohol, turpentine and rosin. From
this rosin India rosin can be made.
The newly discovered process is a
success the whole of a fir tree when
cut for lumber can be utilized. The
by products will also be a source of
great revenue.

Keeping Dandelions From Lawns

There are those who say the dandelion
can not be killed. I know bet-
ter—I've tried it. I have a lawn of
200 feet by 150 feet without a dandelion,
and I didn't rip up my lawn
either.

How do I keep the dandelions out?
I dig them out carefully every spring
and keep a close watch for their reap-
pearance during the summer, thus
avoiding the seeding. Every spring
I scatter plenty of blue grass seed on
my lawn and thus supply it with seed
that is lost to it by reason of frequent
cutting.

Not only that, but when I am dig-
ging dandelions I have a pocket full
of seed handy and drop a pinch of
seed in each hole I make when I ex-
tract the dandelion from the soil.
New grass grows up quickly, fills the
hole and chokes the dandelion.—Den-
ver Post.

Butter from Whey

At Rodman Village, Jefferson coun-
ty, New York, the St. Lawrence
Dairy Products Company has erected
a plant for the manufacture of butter
from whey, and about twenty-five
families are supplying it with sepa-
rator cream taken from the whey.
The butter made is said to be equal to
the best creamery butter. The loss of
butter fat in cheese making has long
troubled factorymen, it being found
impossible to incorporate all the fat
in the cheese. The new system ap-
pears to have solved the question, and
patrons are getting about 2½ cents ad-
ditional per 100 pounds from this
source. The whey is said to be worth
as much for feeding as before, and
not sour as soon, being run
through the separator at a higher
temperature than under the old
method, retarding the action of lactic
acid. About four pounds of butter is
obtained from 1000 pounds of whey.

Surtacing Roads

Practical experience has shown that
the best method of treating the roads
is to surface them with broken stone
or gravel. A very economical plan
has been put in operation for con-
structing object lesson roads of
crushed rock in those sections of the
country where there is no rock or
gravel and the people have had no
chance to see how such road wears
the concrete prepared the crushed rock
without adding to the cost of keeping
them. This does not interfere with
any existing industries, but rather
creates an industry and demand for
free labor. The results for two years
have seemed in every way practical
and successful. When any consid-
erable system of road building is con-
sidered it would be out of the ques-
tion for the state to prepare enough
material for such general distribution.
—A. N. Johnson, state highway en-
gineer.

Cement Hog Wallow

A recent introduction in several
up-to-date farm yards are cement hog
wallow. They are supplied periodi-
cally with fresh water and the ap-
proaches are made by pounding
cobblestones into the earth to prevent
mud sticking in with the water. Some-
times live remedies of an oily nature
are poured in the wallow with the
water. Being lighter, of course the
antiseptic stuff floats and the hogs
can't go in without getting an object
lesson, unless the remedy is harmless
to the hog, inside as well as out, be-
cause hogs will sometimes drink from
the wallow; but this is taken advan-
tage of by using lice killers.—Journal
of Agriculture.

Model of Wonderful Concrete House.

The model of the new Ideal sanitary
concrete house, awarded
the gold medal at the International
Sanitation Congress recently held in
Washington, D. C., is shown in an
illustration appearing in the April
Popular Mechanics. The entire build-
ing, with the exception of the tile
decoration of the roof and the cast
iron window frames are of concrete,
in fact, the house is designed by a
Washington architect, and can be
built for \$1,200.

The great feature of the house is
the extraordinary arrangement for
perfect sanitation, which the article
fully describes. A block of these
houses is now being built in Wash-
ington.

Gathering up light that is lying
around loose in a street and using it
for illuminating signs is possible, says
the April Popular Mechanics, if the
sign in question is of a special type
described in that magazine. The de-
vice makes use of a prismatic glass and
reflecting mirror in such a way as to
gather up the diffused light from
street illumination by night or from
the sky by day and concentrate it
upon the sign. The result is illumina-
tion startlingly like that of a sign
lit by electric or other lamps.

The Colony System

Poultry keeping is the most success-
ful where the colony system prevails.
The colony system means the hous-
ing of the fowls in small houses,
preferably portable, which are easily
moved from place to place. The birds
have free range. The chief advantage
is that fowls are more active or busier
than when confined in yards; second,
there is less danger from outbreaks of
disease, as it is possible to keep the
ground clean around by moving the
houses occasionally; and third, they re-
quire less feeding and care, as they
pick up considerable food on the
range. Another advantage of this
system is that the fowls will rid the
farm of many injurious insects, such
as grasshoppers, beetles, and birds.
The colony system will fit in with crop
rotations and the part of the year
the fowls will live on the stubble fields.

A good size to build a colony house
is 12x12. A team of horses will pull
a house of this size, and it will ac-
commodate 40 to 50 fowls. In very
cold sections I advise the cur-
tain-front, using eight-inch duck
covering one end entirely with this.
In most sections a plain open front
of poultry netting will do, the wire
being put on as a protection against
wild animals.—James Dryden.

12 CALHOUN JURORS READY

Cost of Graft Prosecution to San
Francisco Estimated \$100,000.

San Francisco, April 12.—Twelve
jurors, one of whom may yet be ex-
cused, confronted the attorneys in
the trial of Patrick Calhoun, presi-
dent of the United Railroads, when
the 14th week of the proceedings
opened today.

All the efforts of one department
of the superior court were engaged
from March 31 to April 9 to fill the
eleventh seat in the box. Seven
days of actual trial passed without
the qualification of a single citizen,
although 240 takersmen were sum-
moned by the sheriff and over 100
were subjected to actual interroga-
tion by the attorneys.

City Auditor Koster has prepared
a detailed statement of the cost to
the city of the bribery-graft prosecu-
tions, showing the expense of the
past nine months of the fiscal year
to be \$45,000. With these figures
as a basis of comparison, it is es-
timated that the entire expense at
the close of the fiscal year will reach
a total of \$110,000.

Ocean Tuberculosis Sanitarium

Plans are being discussed in En-
gland to provide an ocean sanitarium
for tuberculosis. The suggestion is to
fit up a sailing vessel of about two
thousand tons, not more than fifty
patients, each to be provided with a
large, private and well ventilated
cabin. The deck would be used for
what is commonly called the "veran-
da treatment." If the plan is carried
out, the ship will cruise in the neigh-
borhood of the Canaries, where it will
have the advantage of the trade
winds and even climate.—From April

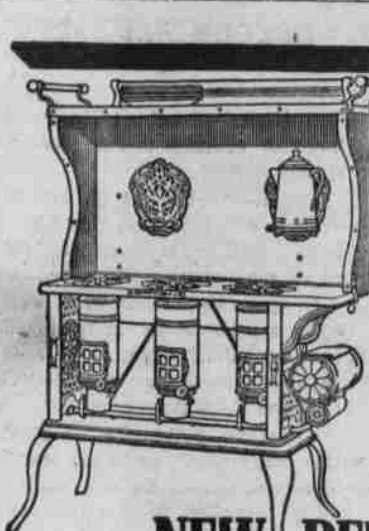
