Driving Away Frosts.

"Protect us against the early frosts,"
says the fruit grower, "and we'll take
chances on anything else." And with the coming of improved
orchard heaters, this demand has been
gratified to such an extent that the
destruction of the crop by frost will
soon be unknown. When a room is
cold you heat it. When the fruit
grower receives warning of an ap-
proaching cold wave he immediately
proceeds to heat his orchard in prac-
tically the same manner as a person
would carry an oil heater into his bed-
room. True smudges, as they were
formerly called, had long been known,
and crudely put into operation, but
no system was ever used and as a
direct consequence their orchards suf-
fered as much from this method as
from the frost.

The heaters are extremely simple.
One, the cylinder heater, is made up
of four parts and stands about two
feet high. It is constructed of ordinary
stovepipe iron, and the lower can is,
in appearance, similar to a ten pound
lard pail. This receptacle holds five
quarts of oil, and will burn five hours
with a large flame. Above this stands
the true, six inches high, five in diam-
eter, and open at both ends. A nat-
ural piece of iron, six inches square,
is used as a cover for the heater when
not in operation, also to extinguish the
flame by saying over the opening, and
lastly, by aid of the hook riveted near
the center, is placed upright on the
edge of the fuel to spread the flame
when a breeze is blowing.

The fuel used is what is commonly
known as smudge or fuel oil, and can
be procured at all refineries for about
two and one half cents per gallon in
car lots. This crude oil burns steady-
ly, gives off a great volume of heat
and very little smoke. From "Keeping

Speaking of Timber.

There is enough timber standing in
the state of Washington to build 55,
000,000 six-room houses, sufficient to
shelter one-third the population of the
United States, or furnish ties for 1,
893,399 miles of railway track, or con-
struct the plant and three inches thick
and 500 feet wide twice around the
world. Cut into lumber these trees
would load 10,000,000 45 foot cars of
20,000 feet capacity, equal to 85,227
miles of train, or one train reaching
three and a half times around the
globe at the equator.—N. W. Farm
and Home.

Tillamook county's principal indus-
try, dairying shows a gratified in-
crease over the year 1907, as is evi-
denced by the reports of three cheese
factories just made public. These are
the Red Clover Creamery Company,
the South Prairie Creamery Company,
and the East Beaver Cheese Company.
Each had an increase in the amount
of milk received making a total of
778,078 pounds. The three manufac-
tured 532,553 pounds of cheese, which
brought in a revenue of \$65,720.27.
During 1908 the average price of but-
ter fat was several cents lower than
in previous years. The average yield
of cheese to the 100 pounds of milk
was 10.9 pounds for these three fac-
tories.

Good Demand for Poultry.

Chicken raising and fruit growing
frequently make a good combination,
especially during the first two or three
years of cropping or clean cultivation,
which every young orchard should
have before the trees come into heavy
bearing. Aside from the sale of eggs
and poultry, which command the
highest cash prices in a ready market
the year round, a chicken runway in
an orchard may be made of great ad-
vantage for the reason that fowl are
destructive to insect life. The
amount of fertility, too, which may be
added to the soil is a matter of im-
portance, when it is known that this
stimulates profitably and successfully
in conjunction with the growing of
small fruit and truck gardening.

Climatic and other conditions are
ideal for fowl, and entirely without
danger of gaupes to deplete the soil,
nor cholera to destroy the full grown
capon, cock or hen. Prices are the
highest in the Northwest, fresh ranch
eggs being in demand the year round
at an average of 30 cents a dozen,
while the average price the year round
for undrawn poultry is 18 cents a
pound, turkeys selling at from 25 to
30 cents a pound. The supply of eggs
and dressed fowl has never been
equal to the demand, and commission
merchants and dealers say it will be
many years before the production will
be adequate to the consumption in
the local market alone.

To Make Grating Wax.

Melt together four parts of resin,
two parts of beeswax and one part of
good beef tallow. Let the substances
melt slightly, and when all are thor-
oughly dissolved and mixed together,
pour into a tub full of cold water.
This produces a soft, frothy waxy sub-
stance which must be pulled at once.
After coating the hands with tal-
low, or soap, pull as you would
taffy, until it changes to a light yel-
low color. The wax is then ready to
use. It will keep indefinitely, if
wrapped in oiled or paraffine paper,
and is usually soft enough to be pulled
at any season of the year, unless
in extremely cold weather. Where
the weather is very cold we use a
grating stove to warm the wax, or
carry it in a pail of warm water.

Bulb Garden a Success

The government bulb garden in
Washington county, western Washing-
ton, is a brilliant success if one may
credit the reports of an acre and a
half of highly colored hyacinths, tul-
ips, narcissus, etc., to be seen near
the site of the old Fort Bellingham
this spring. These were grown from
imported and native bulbs. So great
is the success of the enterprise that
the government is planning to plant
nine acres of bulbs this fall. It is
estimated that \$3,000,000 is expended
annually by the people of the United
States for Holland-grown bulbs, a
large part, if not all, of which the de-
partment of agriculture believes
should be raised at home.

dent here.

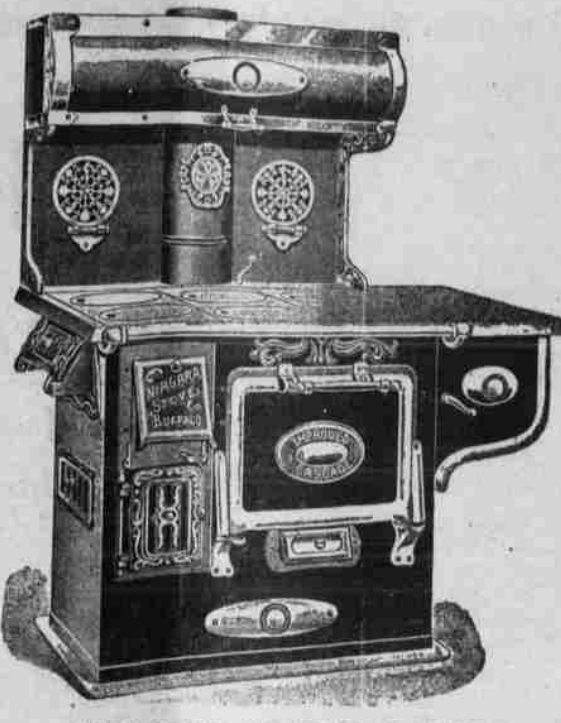
F. T. Deering has sold his mill prop-
