There are lots of small fir poles loaded on the cars at Canby to be used as mining timbers.

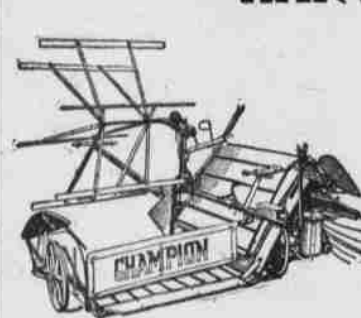
The first blossoms that came on the strawberries were nipped by frost.

Mr. Shafer's sawmill burned down

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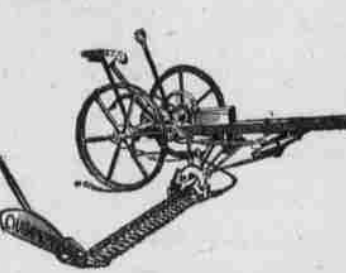


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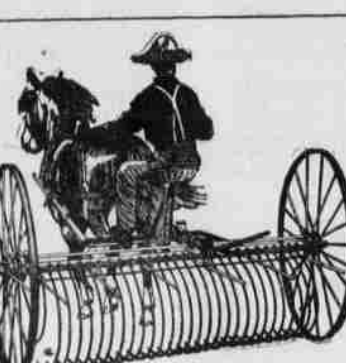
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CHAMPION MOWER
