Taft's DEMANDS TO BE GRANTED

OTHERWISE THE TARIFF BILL
WILL BE SENATE'S.

LUMBER DUTY IS TO BE \$1

President Taft Demands That Rate
and Reductions on Many Other
Commodities.

Washington—According to well-informed members of congress, one week or ten days will suffice for the conference committee to reach an agreement on the tariff bill and the programme to follow the lines of the senate bill, as far as can be done without provoking a veto. The president wants free oil, lumber at \$1, hidden at 5 per cent, with a corresponding reduction on all leather goods, iron ore free and the corporation tax put at 1 per cent instead of 2. It is safe to assume that the president's wishes in these respects will be granted.

Cheaper cotton and woolen goods and cheap hosiery and women's gloves—the former demanded by the house and the latter by the senate—promise to be among the most stubbornly fought questions in the congressional conference on the tariff bill.

Many members express the opinion that the house will yield on cotton and wool and senate on gloves and hosiery in compliance with the protectionists ideas of standstillism. If this should be outcome, it is predicted that vigorous protests would be made in both senate and house from the advocates of downward revision.

MUST PAY FOR ALL WATER

New Irrigation Rule Will Cause
Many Settlers to Lose Farms.

Washington, July 12.—It has been made known that under the new regulations recently issued by the interior department homesteaders on government irrigation projects who have not made full payment for their water, but who have completed five years' residence, cultivation, etc., in full satisfaction of the homestead laws, will no longer be permitted to sell their entries in whole or in part, as was permitted by order of Secretary Garfield. Under the new regulation no settler on a government project can sell any portion of his entry until he has made complete payment for the water.

This modification, it is feared, will be a hardship to poor settlers, who heretofore have been allowed to sell out after satisfying the requirements of the homestead act. If unable to complete payments, they will be dispossessed of their land and forfeit all payments theretofore made.

WHEAT YIELD TO BE LARGE

Northwest Crop Put at 55,000,000 Bushels.

Portland, July 14.—Estimates compiled from data received from more than 350 of the principal wheat stations of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, indicate the 1909 wheat yield for the three states to be approximately 55,000,000 bushels, compared with 40,000,000 last year, 60,000,000 in 1907, and a five-year average of 48,500,000.

Will Cruise Asia's Coast.

Washington, July 12.—Tentative arrangements have been made by the navy department to have the first and second divisions of the Pacific fleet cruise in Asiatic and Philippine waters during next autumn and winter. Rear-Admiral Seabee, commander-in-chief of the fleet, will arrange the details. The vessels probably will leave the Pacific Coast late in August and return to the United States late in March.

Would Have Government Fix Rates.

Seattle, July 13.—A. B. Stickney, president of the Great Western railroad summarized the railroad situation and its relation to general prosperity as follows: "Not until all railroads are consolidated or the government proceeds to do directly what it now attempts to do by indirect means, viz., fixes absolutely all railroad rates, will there be an era of stability and of peace and fair play both to the railroads and the public."

PRESIDENT'S WESTERN TRIP

Journey to Start Upon His Fifty-Second Birthday.

Washington, July 12.—President Taft has abandoned all idea of visiting Alaska this year, largely because Mrs. Taft will not be able to go with him. He feels that she is hardly strong enough to take the Western trip with him.

As soon as the tariff bill is out of the way the president will leave Washington for Beverly, to remain

until September 17, his 52d birthday—when he hopes to begin his western trip. The president will go directly to Seattle, stopping for brief visits en route at Denver, Salt Lake and Spokane.

After visiting the exposition, the president will swing to the southwest, stopping for a time at Portland, and proceeding thence to San Francisco and Los Angeles. Mr. Taft expects to stop for a time at El Paso, where he will meet President Diaz, of Mexico.

Uncle Sam Helps Schools.

Spokane, Wash.—Voters in seven school districts near Port Lapwal, Idaho, will be asked to decide whether a township high school is to be organized at the election this month. The organization plan provides for the consolidation of seven districts, and an organization which will include the Indian departmental school at Fort Lapwal. This will be the first time in the history of the Northwest that Uncle Sam has joined with the people to educate the youths of the district. The Indian children, under the plans proposed, will enter the district schools in the district in which they reside.

Asks States to Vote on Income Tax.

Washington, July 13.—By the decisive vote of 217 to 14, more than the necessary two-thirds, the house passed the senate joint resolution providing for the submission of an income tax constitutional amendment to the states. The negative votes were all cast by Republicans. The resolution now goes to the president for his signature.

SUTTON PLANNED TO KILL

Damaging Statement Made by Colonel Doyen.

Annapolis, July 13.—The forthcoming reinvestigation of the death in 1907 of Lieut. James N. Sutton, U. S. M. C., of Oregon, who, according to the finding of the prior investigators, committed suicide, promises to reveal some sensational details.

It is said that witnesses have been discovered who can testify that on the night he met his death Lieut. Sutton had not been drinking unduly, and that he left Carvel Hall in an automobile with Lieuts. Adams, Roelker, Osterman and Utley.

Colonel Doyen, Commandant of the Marine Barracks when Sutton died, yesterday made a statement saying that in a dispute after the machine entered the grounds, Lieut. Sutton was the aggressor. He further says Sutton was placed under arrest, which he broke, and arming himself with two revolvers he started out to hunt up and kill those who had been his companions. He finally killed himself.

Trial of Murgatroyd Begun.

St. Helens, Or., July 12.—A case likely to develop sensational features before it is concluded was begun in the state circuit court of Columbia county here this afternoon, when George Murgatroyd was placed on trial for the murder at Goble last December of Robert Livingstone, an aged section hand in the employ of the Northern Pacific, who was supposed to have accumulated considerable money, which he kept hid in the cabin in which he was found dying.

Put All Britons in Army.

London, July 13.—The national service bill, which provides for the compulsory service in the territorial army of all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 30, was introduced in the House of Lords yesterday by Lord Roberts.

July Wheat Passes the \$1.20 Mark.

Chicago, July 12.—A new high record for the season was scored today by July wheat, when that option bounded to \$1.20 a bushel, at the opening, amid a wild flurry.
