UNCLE SAM HAS FARMS FOR SALE

OFFERS INDIAN LANDS IN THE NORTHWEST.

REGISTRATION NOW OPEN

Choice of Locations to Be Determined by Lottery, Beginning August 9.

Coeur d'Alene, Ida., July 15.

With the opening of today's mail by James W. Witten, government superintendent of land opening in this place, the first step was taken in the throwing open to white settlement of more than 700,000 acres of agricultural and grazing lands in the northwest.

The government offers to settlers three Indian reservations—that of the Coeur d'Alene Indians in northern Idaho, that of the Spokanes in Washington and that of the Flatheads in Montana. Registration begins today and will continue until August 5. All who desire to register for these lands must go in person to the registration points at Kalspell or Missoula, Mont., to register for Flathead lands, to this city to register for Coeur d'Alene lands and to Spokane to register for Spokane lands. Judge Witten will conduct the lottery for the choice of lands beginning on the morning of August 9.

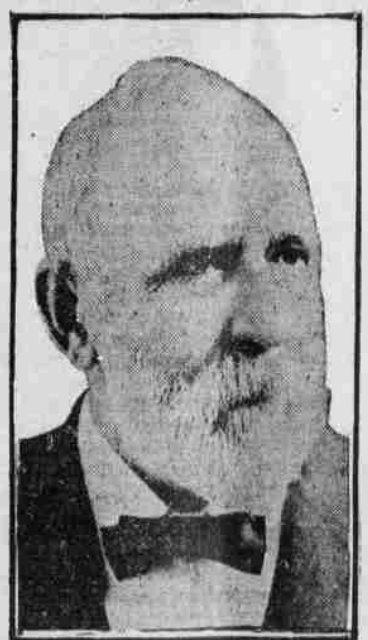
Soldiers and sailors of the civil war, Spanish war and Philippine insurrection or their widows or children may register through agents. This means that the veterans or their heirs do not have to come to the northwest to register.

It must be understood that the lands are not to be given away, but must be paid for within five years on terms fixed by the government, at the rate of from \$1.25 to \$7 per acre. The farms to be sold measure 160 acres each. Only 3000 or 4000 people can hope to receive the prizes.

PINCHOT'S FEARS NEEDLESS

Weyerhaeuser Says Forests Will Last Forever.

Seattle, July 13.—The lumber industry is entering upon an era of renewed activity and prosperity, is the opinion of Frederick Weyerhaeuser, popularly credited with being the "lumber king of America," who is visiting in Seattle. Mr. Weyerhaeuser declares that there is no warrant for the assertion credited to Gifford Pinchot, head of the U. S.

forestry department, that there is danger of exhausting the timber supply of the United States in the next 20 years.

"There is no reason to think the timber supply will not hold out indefinitely," said he. "The lumber outlook is encouraging. Now that the tariff is practically adjusted and on a basis that is reasonably satisfactory to lumbermen, there will be a rapid revival of the industry."

Fight Started on La Follette.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 13.—All indications now seem to point to another political duel between Senator La Follette and W. D. Connor. Three years ago Connor beat La Follette when, as state chairman, he picked up Davidson for governor after La Follette had pinned his faith to Lenroot, whom he has since helped into congress. Now, Connor is planning, it is said, to come out for the United States senatorial nomination.

Eskimo Returns Home.

New York, July 12.—Separated from his native home for 12 years, Mene Wallace, an Eskimo boy brought to this country with five of his people by Commander Peary from the polar regions, sailed Saturday for St. John, N. F., whence he will be conveyed to his home in Greenland.

EVENTS IN OUR STATE OF MINOR IMPORTANCE

Portland—Mayor Simon and the entire Portland city council voted to attend the A-Y-P. Exposition in a body on Portland day, July 20.

Salem—Gov. Benson has issued a requisition the governor of California for Arthur E. Dean, wanted in Lane county for a statutory offense.

Portland—The Oregon State Dental Association held its 16th annual meeting in this city on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The Dalles—Articles of incorporation of the Farmers' Union Warehouse Company of Dufur have been filed with the county clerk. The capital stock is \$4000.

Albany—Arrangements and the programme for the second annual summer Bible school of the Albany College are completed. Prominent speakers will be present at the sessions, which will be held July 16 to 25.

Roseburg—Masons of this city have awarded the contract for their new four-story building for \$20,875. The structure is to be completed by November 1. This building will be the first four-story building in Roseburg.

Marshfield—The little daughter of Vince Pratt was badly injured by a wildcat which escaped from captivity. The child was playing and was attacked and severely bitten and scratched before the animal was killed.

Vale—Owing to the backwardness of the spring, the alfalfa crop will be comparatively light this year in Malheur county. However, the seed crop bids fair to be exceeding good. The farmers in this section realize from \$50 to \$100 an acre from the seed, and it is not uncommon for the yield to bring \$120 an acre.

Albany—There are 6972 children of school age in Linn county, according to the annual report of the county school superintendent. Of this number 3524 are boys and 3448 girls. The report also shows that there are 230 teachers employed in this county, of whom 57 are men and 230 women.

The Dalles—Less than one week after their marriage, which resulted from a correspondence courtship, Frank Fuller, of Burns, Or., is in jail and his bride, who was Mrs. Ellen Roblee, is returning to her home in California. Immediately after the wedding Fuller proceeded to spend his bride's money for whiskey and succeeded in getting rid of about \$100 of her wealth.

Fairview—Paul Duda lost his horse and buggy and barely escaped with his life here Friday. He drove the outfit into the Columbia slough for the purpose of washing the buggy. The horse became entangled in a barbed wire fence and was so badly cut that it bled to death. The buggy was sucked into a deep hole and has not yet been recovered. But for prompt assistance from the neighbors, young Duda would have been drowned.

Bend—Discovery has been made that the wood of the black pine of Central Oregon can be manufactured into a paper pulp of an exceedingly fine and valuable grade. The results of the discovery of marketable value in timber hitherto considered almost worthless will be of vast importance to the entire Central Oregon country, where the stand is remarkable prolific.

Salem—At the midsummer meeting of the State Horticultural Society held here steps were taken to compromise the dispute regarding bequest of \$15,825 left to the society by Cyrus Hoskins of Yamhill county, who died about a year ago. The officers were authorized to settle the matter on the basis of an even division of the amount with the widow, who is contesting the will on the alleged ground that her late husband was insane when he made the instrument.

Marshfield—The coroner is endeavoring to locate the original of a kodak picture of a child which was found in the pocket of Thomas Wilson, a logger who was accidentally killed in a logging camp. The man came here from Canada, but nothing is known of his relatives. He has some property here. He had told fellow-employees that the picture was that of his child and the authorities are anxious that the little one may be found to receive the dead father's estate.

Portland—Since the first of the year approximately \$3600 has been received in the office of the county clerk from the issuance of fishing and hunting licenses. To date there have been issued 2320 fishing licenses at \$1 each; 282 combination hunting and fishing licenses at \$2 each and 658 hunting licenses at \$1 each. The receipts from these licenses are transmitted to the state treasurer at Salem and become a part of the fund established for the use of the state game and fish warden for the protection of the fish and game of the state.

In his speech before the Senate Finance Committee, urging an increase of duty on hops, Senator Bourne said in part: "The duty on hops under the Dingley law is 12 cents per pound, and the same rate has been retained in the Payne bill. The bill as reported by the Senate Finance Committee proposes to increase the rate to 15 cents per pound, but I wish to most respectfully submit that this should be further increased to 20 cents. In support of this contention, I call the attention of the Finance Committee to the fact that the value of the hops produced in this country has declined from about \$12,000,000 in 1906 to \$3,700,000 in 1908, while at the same time there has been an increase in importations of hops and large increases in hop production in Germany and Austria, as shown by a letter from the Secretary of Agriculture which I shall submit herewith.

That the decrease in the value of the American crop bears a very close relation to the increase in importations is indicated by the fact that for ten years up to and including the year 1905 the average annual importation was but 3,059,628 pounds, while the average for the three years 1906, 1907 and 1908 was 8,273,049. During the same three years the price of hops in the United States fell from 19 cents to 8 1/2 cents, and the hop area decreased 19,000 acres.

It will be said that the fall in values has been due to overproduction in this country, but I wish to call the attention of the committee to figures which show that but for the importations in the last three years there would have been no oversupply in this country. The total American crop for the three years was 158,346,000 pounds. The importations for that period amounted to 24,800,000 pounds, but since one pound of the imported hops has double the brewing value of a pound of American hops the importations were equal to

49,600,000 pounds of American hops. The total consumption of both foreign and domestic hops for the three years was 128,000,000 pounds. If the 24,800,000 pounds of foreign hops be deducted and replaced by their equivalent of American hops, it will be seen that the consumption was equal to 153,700,000 pounds of American hops, leaving a surplus of less than 5,000,000 pounds for three years, which would have been more than taken up by exports. But for the importations, the American hop grower would not have sold his crops for less than the cost of production.

At the same time that the American hop industry has been injured by competition with German and Austrian hops the production in those countries has increased from an average of 64,000,000 pounds annually for the ten years prior to 1906 to nearly 98,000,000 pounds for the year 1908. German and Austrian growers are protected by a duty which is practically prohibitive at the present time."

Claiming that the explosions of the

hundred horse power engine in the speedy motor boat has the concession to carry passengers at the foot of the Day Street of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, are so violent that all of the fish in the east end of Lake Union are being killed, the residents along the shore of the lake declare that they will protest with the humane society against the running of the power boat.

According to the complaint the lake shore is lined with dead and stunned fish after every trip of the powerful boat. It is declared that this end of the lake is so shallow that any fish which starys under the swiftly moving craft is sure to be killed by concussion.
