The Bohemia Mining District, Oregon.

The Bohemia mining district, in Lane and Douglas counties, Oregon is described in a brief report by D. E. MacDonald that forms part of the United States Geological Survey's Bulletin 380—"Contributions to economic geology, 1908, Part 1." The district lies on Calapooia Mountain, in a region of bold relief, and luxuriant vegetation—a region noted for its timber resources.

The ore deposits are fissure veins that contain free gold, which have been developed by several mines. Mr. MacDonald sketches the general geology, the ore deposits, and the mining development of the district, and includes notes on the mode of ore deposition. The report is included in an advance chapter of Bulletin 380 known as Bulletin 380-A, which may be had on application to the Director of the Survey at Washington.

REVOLUTION ARISES AGAINST ALFONSO

TURMOL IN SPAIN POSTPONES VISIT TO COWES.

COUSIN IS POPULAR HERO

King Is Denounced as Being a Tool of the Clericals and Under the Influence of England.

Madrid, July 28.—Owing to the grave situation here, especially the revolutionary propaganda among the troops, a strict censorship has been established over all telegrams. It is impossible to send anything direct from Madrid. Revolutionary activity has assumed astonishing proportions, characterized by fierce attacks upon King Alfonso for being subject to foreign—that is, English—influence. He has, therefore, cancelled his projected visit to Cowes.

The workmen and Democratic organizations in Catalonia province

have been forbidden to hold meetings protesting against the war in Morocco. The workmen made manifestations in the streets, cut the telephone wires and surrounded the station, preventing a train from leaving for Barcelona. A general strike has been declared in Barcelona as a protest against the Spanish-Morocco war. The government replied by proclaiming a state of siege, which is equivalent to martial law.

The Madrid newspapers have been notified that hereafter they will not be allowed to print special dispatches from the seat of war until their accuracy has been confirmed by the general staff.

The King's action in punishing his cousin Don Alfonso Bourbon, for his romantic marriage with Princess Beatrice of Coburg is actually also made a ground of attack. He is denounced as being merely a tool of the Clericals, and his hostile measures against his cousin, which he took entirely out of deference to Spanish feeling, are attributed to foreign influences also.

HENEY'S SALARY PUZZLES

Next Congress May Start Probe on Special Prosecutor.

Washington, July 27.—If interest can be awakened in the Heney case when congress reassembles next December, it is more than likely that a special congressional committee will be appointed to probe into the employment of Mr. Heney, his work as a special prosecutor for the department of justice and his remuneration, made from time to time, under direction of the department of justice.

Three Lives Lost in Wabash Fire.

Wabash, Wash., July 26.—In a fire Sunday morning which destroyed the Farmers' Lodging House, three men lost their lives. They are: John Frey, Cottage Grove, Ore.; George Burkhardt, Redmond, Ore., and an unknown man who was selling a soldering fluid for a Spokane company.

To Study Eastern Oregon Oil Fields.

Washington, July 26.—Representative Ellis today asked the director of the geological survey to make an investigation of the oil fields of Eastern Oregon to determine the extent of the oil deposits and the commercial value of the oil.

Fatal Railroad Wreck.

Kansas City, July 26.—Six lives were lost and 36 persons were injured, three perhaps fatally, in the wreck of a Wabash passenger train when it plunged into the Missouri river, 30 miles east of here, Saturday night. For days flooded waters have been undermining the roadbed, and when the train was on the track paralleling the river, fifty feet suddenly gave way.
