In Germany there are 99 public sanatoria for adult convalescents with 10,539 beds, besides 99 private sanatoria with 2,175 beds. In 18 sanatoria for children with tuberculosis there are 837 beds, a total of less than 13,000 beds, showing that this country is in the lead in the Anti-Tuberculosis war. France has only 12 sanatoria for adult convalescents, with a total capacity of 145 beds. All of these institutions are private except the sanatorium at Agincourt.

GOVERNMENT AND STATE IN CLASH

Federal Employee Will Not Tell of Alleged Distillery.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 26.—Lawyers and Judges of the state are intensely interested in the serious clash now on between the state and the Federal authorities in the case of Chas. E. Stegall, a government gauger, in jail in Trenton, Ga., for contempt of court by order of Judge A. W. Fite, of the Dade County Superior Court. Stegall, under instructions from the Internal Revenue Collector, refused to testify before the grand jury in reference to an alleged distillery.

Under the United States laws, Government employees are liable to loss of position, fine and imprisonment if they divulge information secured in their official capacity.

Stegall has appealed to the Federal authorities in Atlanta for protection. As the Government cannot afford to allow its employees to be kept in prison for obedience to Government rules, the Federal officials determined to stand by Stegall.

Governor May Call Troops.

Montgomery, Ala., Sept. 26.—Because of a threat to go over their heads and enforce prohibition laws in the intense way he thinks he should, Governor B. B. Comer, head and front of the movement for constitutional prohibition, has brought down the wrath from many of the Sheriffs of the state.

The Governor is demanding action, and Sheriffs of larger cities will not feel surprised any day to see troops flocking to raid places.

WILL ASK CONGRESS FOR \$10,000,000

Urges Bond Issue by Congress to Complete Irrigation Project.

Taft Urges Bond Issue for Irrigation.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 28.—In a speech on the conservation of natural resources, delivered here today, President Taft declared that he would ask Congress to authorize the issuance of \$10,000,000 in bonds to complete irrigation projects already begun in the West and on which work has been stopped for lack of funds. This has been the hope of many settlers in the arid regions who had taken up lands, anticipating securing a supply of water to make them fertile, and the President's declaration was enthusiastically cheered.

16,582 Acres Open for Entry.

Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 27.—Choice timber lands, 16,582 acres in the North Fork of the Clearwater territory, were opened for entry at the United States land office Monday.

The state has a six-day priority right to file on this land, but a large number of actual settlers, some of whom have been on this land under the squatter's privilege, will have a right earlier than the state.

Rates Cut as Result of Rate War.

Los Angeles, Sept. 26.—A new turn was taken in the steamship rate war on the Pacific Coast, when the West Coast Steamship Company posted a bulletin cutting the rates clear through to Puget Sound.

The Seattle rate first-class has been cut from \$23 to \$19, with a \$6.50 cut on the steerage rate. A cut of \$4 has been made to Grays Harbor and a corresponding reduction to Portland.

Film Exchange is Tragic Scene.

Pittsburg, Sept. 27.—Fifty persons were injured and several are believed to have been killed shortly before noon when an explosion occurred in the Columbian Film Exchange, in the Ferguson building, on Fourth avenue. Hundreds of firemen are searching the ruins for victims. The structure was eight stories high. Every office was wrecked.
