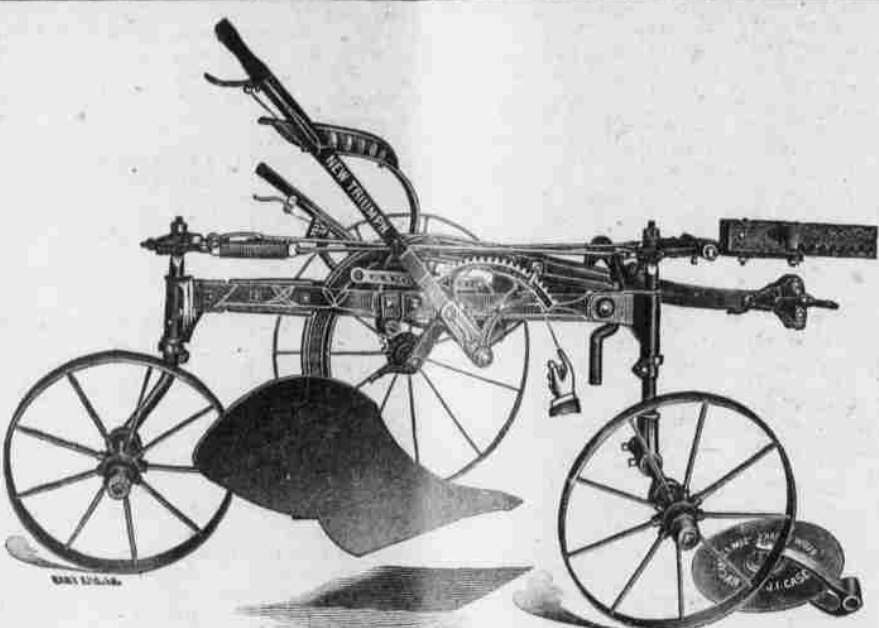
J. Swartz has had a telephone installed at his place.
