GLADSTONE

At the regular meeting of the Gladstone Improvement Club held Monday, October 11th, the committee on incorporation submitted a charter for Gladstone, to the club for discussion. Under the charter the boundaries of the town of Gladstone will include all of the Fendal C. Cason donation land claim and that part of the south half of the P. M. Rinearson donation land claim which lies east of the county road. No officers of the city will receive any stipend, except the city recorder. The tax levying power of the council is limited to five mills. The charter also contains a clause against the sale of vinous, malt or spirituous liquors, and Gladstone will be a dry town from the start. The club is taking up this charter and discussing it section by section. Section 1, which sets out the boundaries of the proposed town was laid over for a further discussion at the meeting to be held on Monday night, October 18th, at 7:30. Sections 2 to 31 inclusive were adopted by the club as read. The club will hold weekly meetings on each Monday night until the whole charter is thoroughly gone over and has been formulated according to the pleasure of the majority of the residents of Gladstone. After the club has gotten the charter into shape it will be submitted to the electors for adoption or rejection as by law prescribed for the incorporation of cities.

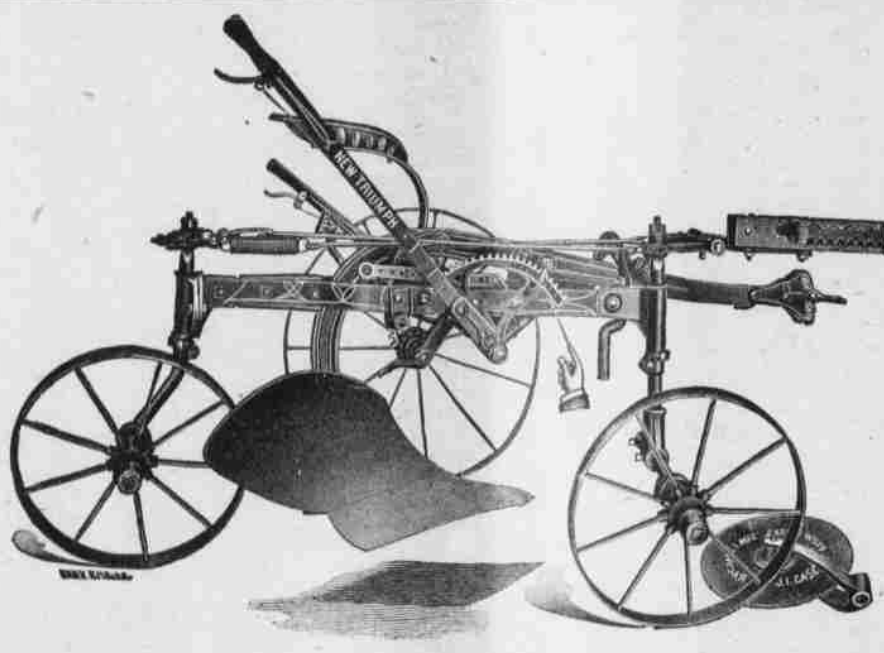
