Miss Pearl Hampton was a Portland caller Tuesday.

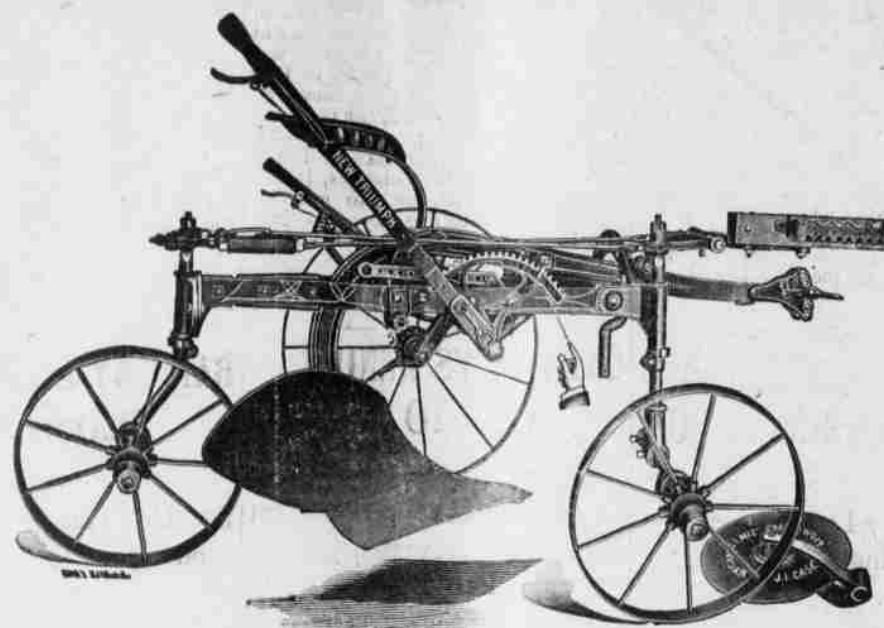
