The Elliott family are quarantined on account of diphtheria.

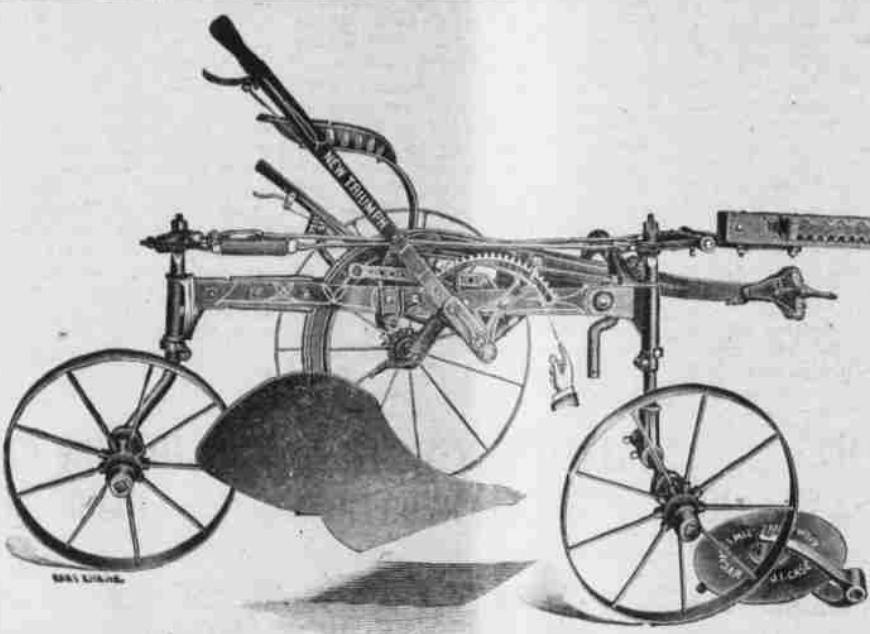
SOUTH CARUS
