We understand that John Helvey has gone to Wallace Island to work for the winter.

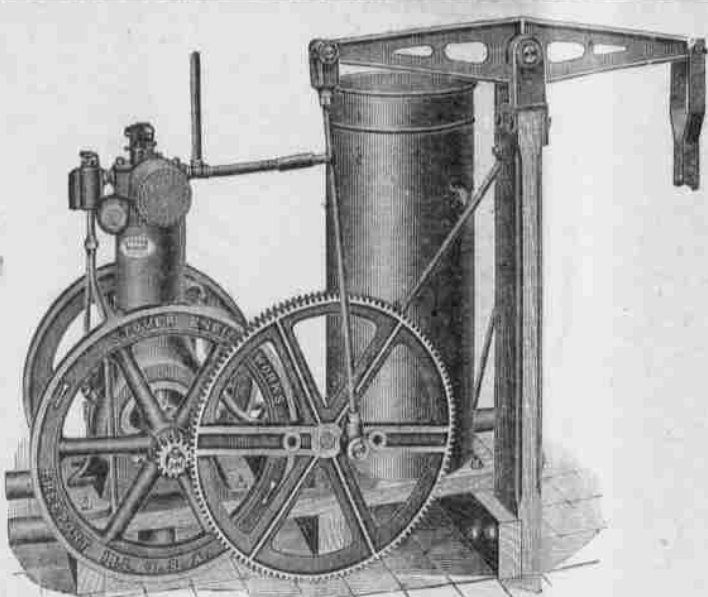
