DEDICATE OAK GROVE SCHOOL

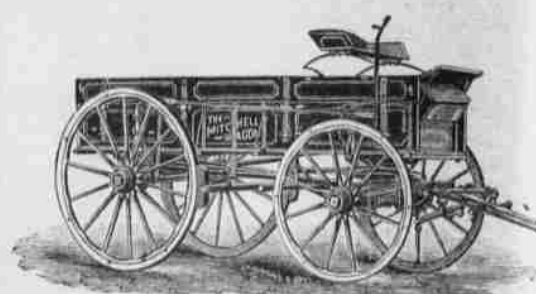
Interesting Program Given in Connection Friday Night

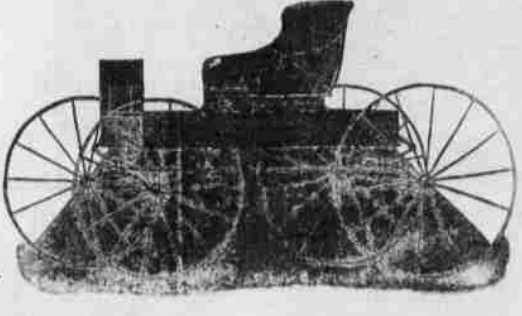

The Canby Canal Co. has finished its lower headgates to Power Plant "A." The design and construction of these headgates are entirely different from any headgates ever constructed on any stream, the design making it impossible for the river to wash around them. The Molalla is a very treacherous river and on account of its low banks, is impossible to dam. Consequently it was necessary to depart from the regular rule of power plants and construct these headgates below the bed of the river. The gates will be two in number and six feet wide. The intake pan is of solid concrete, 24 feet square and two feet thick. The headgates with their pillars, heavy side walls and wings are built as the Romans built them centuries ago. If good weather should prevail the switch should be thrown to light the towns of Hubbard, Aurora, Barlow and Canby by January 1st.
