About six inches of snow on the ground and still falling.

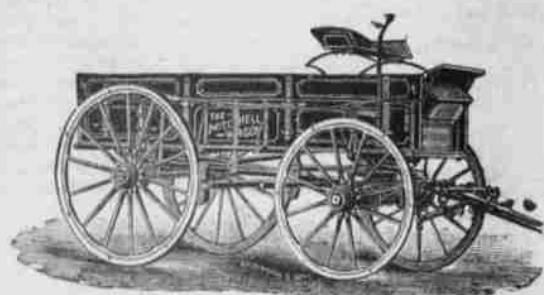
The surveyors for the new railroad have been at work on the James Bay ranch for the past week.

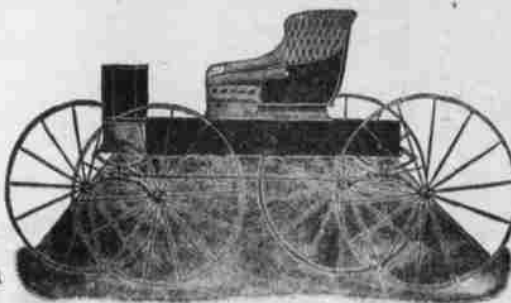
