True Blessedness, Matt 5:1-16.
Gold Text. Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God. Matt. 5:8.
Verses 1, 2—How much do you remember of the last sermon you heard? To what extent is the modern style of taking a text and preaching a sermon from it, a success as a teaching exercise?
