Misses Alice Elsie and Louise Zimmerman spent a week in Portland with friends and relatives recently.

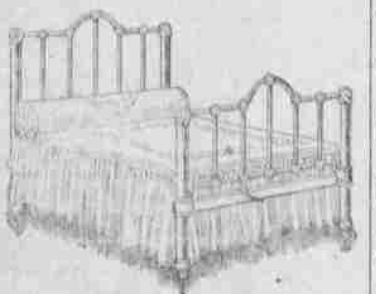

To amend chapter XII of an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the city of Oregon City, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict therewith," approved February 25, 1895, as amended by an act to amend Section 4 of chapter I, section 6 of chapter II, section 39 of chapter VII, sections 114, 120, 121 and 125 of chapter XIV thereof, approved January 25, 1898, and an act to amend section 7 of chapter II, section 43 of chapter VIII, and section 50 of chapter IX thereof, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 19, 1903.
