FARMERS' CORNER

Helpful Articles regarding Agriculture, Horticulture, and Poultry and Stock Raising, Gathered from Far and Near.

Oregon Walnuts

For a good many years there has been in this Northwest a few walnut trees planted out and walnuts grown and it seems strange as these few trees are bearing good quality and quantity of walnuts that no one had gone into this branch of horticulture to any extent. Walnut trees make equally the same growth as prune trees. They commence to bear at seven years of age then steadily increase in amount. Most orchards of 50 acres of bearing trees will yield 13 tons of walnuts. There are some advantages in walnut culture over other crops. They require less care and anxiety to harvest and dispose of. We have good soil and suitable location. There is going to be continued demand and walnut growing in Oregon and in fact the whole Northwest will, we believe, increase in volume and prove to be one of our leading crops.

Then there are by-products. There are inquiry cardinals picked green to be used for pickles. Annually large quantities of pickled walnuts are imported and prices at which they are sold are very high. They are also used for dyeing purposes, giving a

shade difficult to obtain except by using walnuts. The confectioners, bakers and vegetarians are using more and more.

Pheasant Farming

The Chinese pheasants were not introduced into Oregon until 1882, and then only fifty birds were liberated. Now there are many breeders in Oregon. "Pheasant Farming" is becoming very practical. If you can raise turkeys you can raise pheasants. Like turkeys, when they are matured they are very hardy, in fact, the similarity between the young pheasant and young turkey is very marked. Treatment adapted to turkeys may safely be applied to pheasants. Pheasants may be hatched in incubators and reared in brooders, or good results have been obtained by setting the eggs under common hens. After forty-eight hours old the young pheasant may be fed sparingly on hard boiled eggs, chopped fine with a little onion tops, fresh ground, lean meat, crumbled with shorts or corn meal, and later dry chick food, boiled rice and corn.

Speaking of these game birds, the

pheasant farmer never shoots the birds nor does anything which tends to frighten them from their fields, holding them friends rather than enemies, the pheasants doing far more good than harm to their crops, by the destruction of insects.

The growth of the industry of raising game for market, like cattle and poultry, is manifested in legislation in many states during the last few years. A dozen states now have such provision in their laws, and the production and marketing of domesticated game seems destined to become an industry that will demand more recognition in future legislation. Dotted all through the valley of the Willamette, will be seen the pheasant farms which have proved to be very successfully carried out, both for pleasure and profit, so much so that booklets on the subject have been gotten out by some of the extensive breeders describing the methods and success of the breeding of pheasants.

Care of Winter Poultry

Why not agitate the establishment of more poultry farms, one of the much needed industries in Oregon. Urge your customers to consider raising chickens. Oregon is shy on promoters of the poultry industry. Chickens and eggs are almost beyond the reach of ordinary people, financially speaking. Because the supply is not equal to the demand. The essentials to profitable egg production are a healthy flock of fowls possessing constitutional vigor, bred from a laying strain; proper housing, and correct feeding. The best way to secure a laying strain on the farm is to select the hens of greatest vigor that naturally produce the most eggs during the winter, mate these hens with a good male, also from a laying strain, and then select only the best daughters from this mating.

Not enough importance is usually attached to the selection of laying hens. They must be properly cared for, if they are to lay well during the winter and summer. Houses must be kept sanitary and the fowls free from vermin. Care must be exercised to avoid their being chased by dogs or other animals, or unnecessarily frightened. Poultry houses must be well ventilated, and one or more windows should be opened every bright day, so that the house will become warm during the day and grow cold again at night.

Poultrymen should remember that hens should always be kept busy searching for food, so that they may get sufficient exercise. The fowls should be sent to roost at night with full crops and gotten off the roost in the morning to scratch in straw or leaves for grain during the day. For winter egg production the best method is to imitate nature's summer feeding conditions for fowls, which involve some grain from the litter and some green food. A cabbage or a few beets suspended from the roof or some clover or alfalfa chaff fed either dry or wet are good. It is preferable to keep a box of dry chaff constantly before the fowls, allowing them to eat all they wish.

The meat food must not be omitted, as this takes the place of the insects eaten naturally by fowls during the summer. Either green bone or beef scrap will do, or pieces of meat left at butchering time. Some skim milk may also be fed to advantage, and will help greatly in egg production. The amount given should be small at first, and then increased gradually on

til the flock has all they will drink up clean each day. As much poultry feed as possible should be grown on the farm, but additional feed may be bought as necessary, such as bran, middlings, gluten meal, or best scraps. The floor of a poultry house is a subject that is very interesting to all poultry raisers and is also one that is attracting more and more attention. The winter season demands that poultry houses must be provided with suitable floors. The idea that any kind of a floor will do is very wrong. They are an absolute necessity and should be treated as such.

One man says to, use cement floors, another says nothing can equal the pine floor covered with straw for the birds to work in, while some say nothing but earth for floors for them. Some have cement floors covered over with six or seven inches of fine loam, which is an ideal floor. The subject of proper floors is one demanding considerable attention, if one wants his fowls to do well. o, therefore, a large amount of practical common sense is what is needed. Young poultry delight in sunbathing, but the late hatched chicks and turkeys must have protection from the intense heat in summer. See that the looses are properly ventilated at night. To couple fowls to roost in a close, filthy place is a good way to have unhealthy stock.
