Oregon City does ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 2 of ordinance No. 208, entitled "An ordinance regulating the registry of dogs and providing for the taking up, impoundng and killing of dogs without license ags." Approved November 19, 1897, hereby amended so as to read as

Section 2. The city treasurer shall keep a register, wherein shall be entered the owner of the dog, to whom a tag has been issued, the number and date of such tag, and the amount paid therefor.
