Obituary

Jackson Knotts was born near Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 9, 1842. His boyhood days were spent near the place of his birth and it was from this home that he went forth to fight for his country in the war of the rebellion, enlisting in Co. A, 30th Iowa Volunteer Infantry in 1862 and serving faithfully until honorably discharged at the close of the war in 1865. The following year he came west with a company of immigrants who crossed the plains with ox teams and it was on this trip that he made the acquaintance of Miss Martha Casaday, to whom he was married Aug. 29, 1867. They made their home on Birch creek near Pilot Rock, Unadilla County, Ore., where they resided two years. In 1869 they came to Caras, this county. Lived there one year and it was from thence that they came to their present surroundings near Mulino, where they have resided ever since with the exception of three years spent near Melama on the Santitas.

His children were born to our friend whom are living, Clarence E. of Baker City, Mrs. Laura Burns of Canby, Mrs. Tillie Coleman of Orcutt, Cal., and Mrs. Carrie Nash of Oregon City.

Upon the organization of Mohalla Grange No. 40 in 1873, Mr. and Mrs. Knotts became charter members of that organization and have remained faithful patrons of that order from that time to the present. He was also a member of Mead Post G. A. R. of Oregon City.

Over three years ago Mr. Knotts suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never fully recovered and which finally resulted in his death. He departed this life at 10:30 o'clock March 8, 1910, at the ripe age of 68 years and 1 month.

Besides his widow, 4 children and 16 grandchildren he leaves a host of friends to mourn the loss of a congenial neighbor and honored citizen.

Many floral offerings from friends showed the high esteem in which he was held. Mr. Knotts was active in all social and public affairs when in good health and made many friends wherever he went. Interment was made in the Canby cemetery.

Ordinance No.—

An ordinance to amend section two of ordinance No. 208, entitled "An ordinance regulating the registry of dogs and providing for the taking up, impounding and killing of dogs without license tags." Approved November 19, 1897.

Oregon City does ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 2 of ordinance No. 208, entitled "An ordinance regulating the registry of dogs and providing for the taking up, impounding and killing of dogs without license tags," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. The city treasurer shall keep a register, wherein shall be entered the owner of the dog, to whom a tag has been issued, the number and date of such tag, and the amount paid therefor. The city treasurer is hereby directed to procure the necessary tags mentioned in section 1, and annually to collect or receive from the owner of any male dog the sum of five dollars, and from the owner of any female dog the sum of ten dollars for such tag; the annual time for issuing the tags as herein provided, and the time when each and all tags shall expire shall be the first day of April of each year. No tag shall be issued for a less period than one year. The city treasurer shall pay all moneys received for the tags into the general fund.
