Follow their advice only in so far as it takes you onward. But by all means use them as a beginning. Take from these the cream and with the cream of good old common sense you'll make better that will be an impetus to keep the bread box filled. The mish mish that tickles for the moment and causes you to laugh at your own absurdity after they have been read is not for you.
