Miss Anna Hardin returned home Monday from working a few days for Mrs. Kattelle.

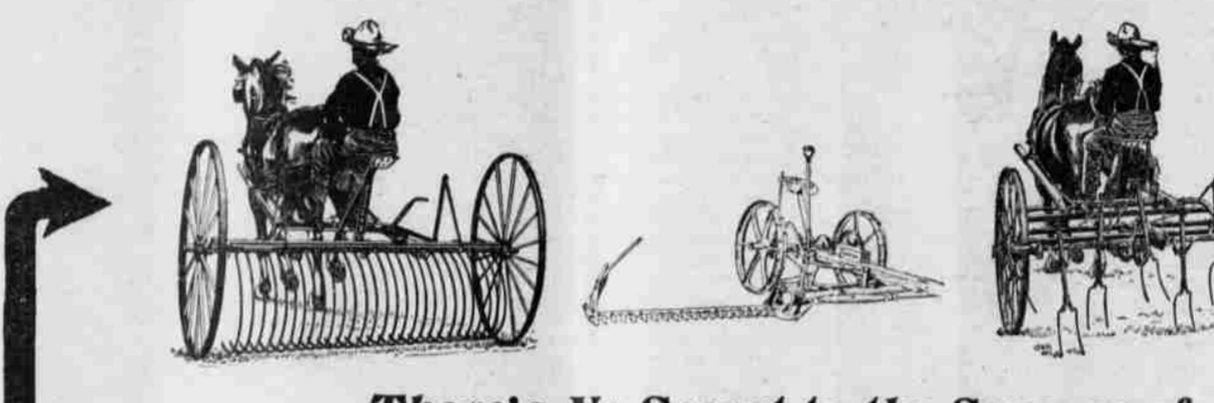
