The proposition of a union of Viola, Redland, Fingrove, Evergreen, Upper and Lower Logan school districts will be voted on at the annual school meeting May 30th. One of the first questions will naturally come to be as to the probability of the amount of tax necessary to build and support such an institution. The proposed districts have a valuation of about \$800,000. A 14 mill tax or \$1.50 per \$1000 would raise sufficient funds to build and equip a school building sufficient to accommodate each one can figure for himself his individual share according to his valuation at last assessment. We are banking largely on the supposition that the high school fund law will go into effect after the November election, which will naturally mean to run the school. Should the proposed law pass—as in all probability it will—we will have a small tax to pay whether we have a high school or not. Should it not pass we can either support the school by a small tax or let the proposition go by default by not voting a tax. It may not be necessary to argue the advantages of a country high school, they being apparent to all, but aside from the benefit of having our children at home while taking the higher grades, such an institution would increase land valuation and would help draw good settlers into our community. The present plan of sending young people to the city high school cannot be indulged in by the average farmer and it does not seem fair that all should not have the same educational advantages, at least to the extent of a high school course.

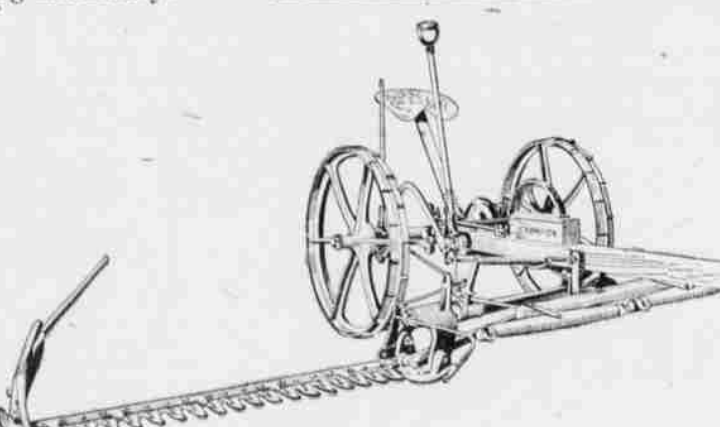
