Opinions from all over the United
States may be had upon the great
question of why the people do not get
what they should have, yet there are
few states that are making the head-
way apparent in Oregon. The people
of this state have settled the question,
and the hard but futile fight that is
now being waged by the assembly
followers proves the conclusive evi-
dence of a death struggle. With only
three or four papers in the state
preaching the work of destruction,
and with a mere handful of faithfuls,
what can be the outcome but defeat?

The new publicity committee of the
Commercial Club scored a point along
the right lines when they took up the
matter of increasing the city's popu-
lation as a first work to be done, for
the largest one of the mills immedi-
ately fell in line with their work by
promising aid with employment
for about one hundred men of family,
when the mills are running full, start-
ing about October first. The mill
management will not make any
change in its plans nor the personnel of
its help. The new citizens will not
take the places of any of the regular
employees, but will be employed in-
stead of the transient help which in
no way helps the improvement and
advancement of the city, county and
state. There is room for more than
100 married men who are willing to
work. Wages of \$2 and better per day
with good chances of advancement as
they become proficient are assured.
Citizens and heads of families are
wanted. The publicity committee
solicit the aid of one and all in this
work, which will surely end the dis-
satisfaction expressed of late on ac-
count of some of the labor employed
in the various mills.

The outcome of an experiment to be
conducted by burned-over timber in Coos
county by the Santa Fe Railroad will
be watched with interest throughout
the Pacific Northwest. If successful,
it will mean that large areas of forest,
formerly considered useless, will be-
come valuable for the burned-over
timber yet remaining. The Santa Fe
has contracted for 1200 cedar piling

from such a tract in Coos county. If
the charred piling proves a success,
much more of the same material will
be bought by the Santa Fe and a wide
market will be found for this now ap-
parently worthless timber.

Portland ends the cereal shipping
year May 31, holding second place in
the entire country as a wheat export-
ing city. New York alone has a
greater volume to its credit. During
the past 12 months Portland has sent
away 6,350,033 bushels of wheat, val-
ued at \$5,791,394.

Together with the Great Northern,
the Northern Pacific will carry on a
work of exploitation of Oregon.
Writers and publicity men are now
being enlisted by the line to work up
material to be used throughout the
country in spreading the knowledge of
Oregon broadcast. With the Hill lines
actively engaged in the work of pub-
licity, large results can be expected.

Salem, the capital city, will hold
its annual cherry fair on July 7, 8
and 9. The event promises to be a
big affair and is being widely adver-
tised. People from the entire valley
will attend and unusual preparations
are being made to entertain them.
There will be keen competition be-
tween the valley counties for prizes
in the cherry exhibits and amusement
features of the fair will be better than
ever.

Large appropriations for Oregon
waterway improvements are available
by the passage of the Rivers and Har-
bors bill by the recent congress.
More than \$1,000,000 will be spent in
perfecting the jetty at the mouth of
the Columbia River and additional
funds are provided for dredging the
Lower Willamette and Columbia riv-
ers. The improvement of the upper
Willamette and Columbia is provided
for, as is the Cello Canal, which gets
\$600,000.

The high prices for food products
are driving many people back to the
farm. The belief of those who have
given the matter attention. It is con-
tended that not for years has the
movement been so noticeable as now.
All parts of the Pacific Northwest are
being benefited it is said, by this de-
sertion of the cities and return to the
soil. Confidence is expressed that
this will balance production and con-
sumption and bring prices of farm
products down to lower levels.

Attention is called by the Oregonian
to the growth of the livestock indus-
try in the Pacific Northwest. On one
day of last week it says ten carloads
of what were received at Portland
and 40 carloads of livestock. It is
maintained that the stock grower will
become a more important factor in the
prosperity of the state than the wheat
grower within the coming ten years.
Then there will be more wheat
grown than at present, but the live-
stock industry will have expanded to
a remarkable degree by that time,
due to Portland having the greatest
stockyards and packing plant on the
Pacific coast. This means much to
the city's future. It is believed.

Report of Publicity Work.

Board of Governors of the Oregon
City Commercial Club, Oregon City,
Ore.
Gentlemen: Obedient to your or-
der, conveyed me by the chairman of
the publicity committee, Mr. Frank
Bensch, for a report of the affairs of
my office, I respectfully comply the e-
with.

By joint action of the members of
the publicity committee and the board
of advisors, I was, on March 7, 1910,
elected to fill out the unexpired term
of my predecessor, Mr. S. P. Davis.
My term expired June 1. At a meet-
ing of the said committee held May
30, I was continued in the office until
July 1.

The total receipts of the office from
all sources, from July 14, 1909, to
June 25, 1910, were \$4864.65; total of
all warrants issued were \$3836.70; bal-
ance on hand in bank July 1, \$1027.95;
total amount of pledges unpaid to
date, \$178.

Since January 1, 1910, this office has
received 1387 letters of inquiry. Of
this number Mr. Davis received 545
and I received 842. In addition to
these, a large number have been sent
out to addresses furnished by the
Portland Commercial Club.

There has been paid out for Eastern
advertising since March 7, 1910,
\$193.57; for advertising in the Port-
land Sunday papers, \$139; to the Ore-
gon City Courier, \$60.30.

Your committee appropriated \$200
to defray the expenses of the Willam-
ette Open River and Freight Rate
Convention, held in this city April
27, 1910. By the report which was
submitted May 4, it was shown that
after all bills were fully paid there
was an unexpended balance of \$74.30
and that the expenses therefor were
only \$125.20. The balance was re-
turned to the credit of the publicity
fund.

Between January 1 and May 10,
sales of property to 55 newcomers to
Clackamas county amounted to nearly
\$200,000, and their advent is largely
due to the work of the publicity de-
partment.

Many bundles of literature have
been distributed in various localities
since March 1.

This office was of material assist-
ance in the united census of 1910.
In the line of newspaper publicity
for Oregon City and Clackamas coun-
ty, this office has been instrumental in
causing the publication of numerous
articles, none of which has caused the
expenditure of money. To give an
adequate idea, I will state that be-
tween March 5 and June 25, inclusive,
there have appeared a total of 914 lin-
ear inches, equal to a little more than
76 feet. The plan has been adopted of
preserving all these articles in a scrap
book, which will be valuable for fu-
ture reference.

An alphabetical index of all corres-
pondents, together with their ad-
dresses has been prepared. Carbon
copies of all letters written to cor-
respondents who may become settlers
here are kept on file; a similar plan is
followed for all business correspon-
dence. The work of the office has been
carefully systematized and kept up to
date.

Recently you authorized and en-
tered into a contract with the Port-
land Chamber of Commerce for an ex-
hibit from Clackamas county, to con-
tinue for the remainder of the year
in its headquarters at Portland. Owing
partly to the backwardness of the
season, perhaps, and to lethargy as
well, this exhibit is not yet full.
However, I am assured that this coun-
ty and Clackamas county are the only
ones who are really doing anything
thus far.

A harmonious feeling exists between
your body and the commercial orga-
nizations of the Portland, Oregon City
and Clackamas county owe it to
themselves that they keep in the lime-
light. This department is free from
debt.

Most of the contributors to the pub-
licity fund have been commendably
prompt in paying their obligations.
For myself, I am constrained to say
as little as possible. I have faithfully
tried to discharge my duties and to do
by my department as I would have
each of the members do by me. My
personal relations have been uniformly
harmonious with all of you, and I de-
sire to thank you all for your many
courtesies and kindnesses to me. I
have not been free from errors, I
know, but such as I have made have
been those of the head and not of the
heart.

I desire to state that I succeeded in
making arrangements with the Oregon
Posters, of Portland, a Swedish paper
of wide circulation, for about half a
page in its special edition of June 1,
amounting to some 10,000 copies.
This gave publicity to Oregon City
and Clackamas county, was profusely
illustrated, and was secured at no
cost to this department. Also, I
have placed two illustrations of this
city and county in the annual pro-
gramme of the State Dental Associa-
tion, which carries with it no ex-
pense.

The only unfavorable element in the

of federal lawmakers and state offi-
cials towards the railways and the

cost of operation. When the man-

prices for raw material and increased
