State University Notes

The doors were opened Sept. 20 at the State University, Eugene, for the school year. From the number of applications for admission which came in advance, a good gain in attendance over that of last year is anticipated. The total enrollment in all departments of the University for last year was 1,031.

Admission to the State University is based upon the completion of the regular state high school course of four years. The number of high schools throughout the state has increased so rapidly of late years that within the last three years the enrollment of the University has been practically doubled.

The board of regents found it necessary to add four new instructors to the teaching force, besides several assistants. Dr. O. J. C. Bennett, president of the State Normal School, Fairmount, West Virginia, was elected to the chair of psychology, to take the place of Prof. Benjamin Hawthorn, retired on Carnegie pension. Mr. Arthur J. Collier, for many years in active service in the field force of the United States geological survey, was elected to the chair in geology, which has not been regularly occupied since the death of Dr. Thomas Condon, the former head of the department. Mr. George Lusk, from Concordia College, and professor of German in the Bloomington High School, Illinois, was made assistant in the department of German. And Mr. E. J. Kempthorne, from the University of Wisconsin, was made an assistant in the mathematics department. Several assistants in addition have had to be appointed from the University's graduates and students.
