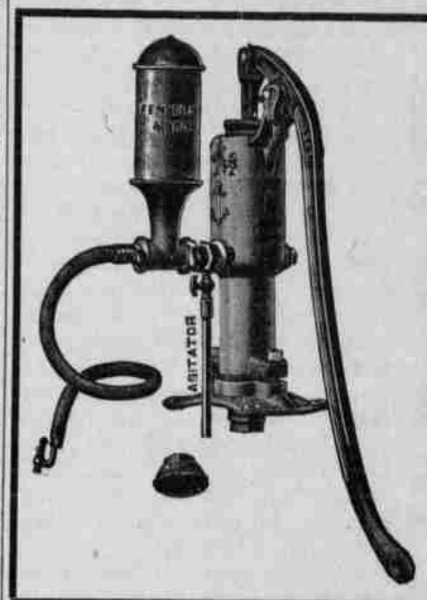
"Queens of Avilon" Give Social.
