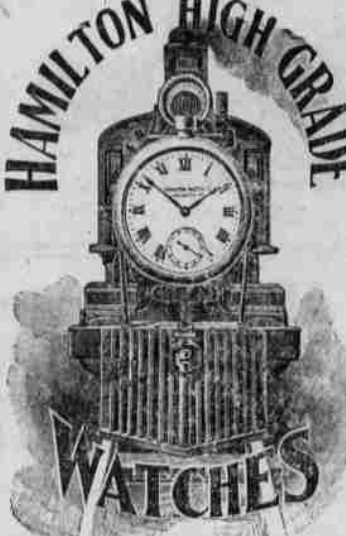

It is Time for Something to be Done in Criminal Oregon.

Although he was known to a number of people and a very good description is had of him, yet he has simply lost himself, disappeared and no actual trace of him has been found since the murder was committed, 15 days ago.

But the Courier editor knows that it is a lot easier to sit back and criticize officials than it is to catch criminals.

Once let a criminal get the jump, and in a state of Oregon it is a mighty hard proposition to find him—providing he has brains enough to be crafty and the most of them have.

Sheriff Mass hasn't a secret service bureau at his command, nor has he thousands of dollars of the county's money he can spend running down clues. He simply has to do the best he can with his means.

Yet there is no use of dodging the situation that this state has far too many criminals outside the penitentiary and too many murderers uncaught.

There is no getting away from the necessity of catching these murderers, train robbers and burglars.

The governor of Oregon should offer rewards for the uncaught murderers of this state, and monthly add to them until there would be inducement enough to bring the best detectives of the country here to hunt down these fiends and hang them.

Oregon is getting a bad reputation—a reputation that it can't catch murderers and that train robbing is a pastime.

Give some holdup man the full prison limit and some murderer the rope's noose, and the thugs will have another think.

But you've got to catch a man before you can hang him, and we should catch him, even if it is necessary to start a police department throughout the state to raise a reward big enough to do the business.

GOOD STARTER.

One Timber Co. Offers Clackamas Railroad 20 Years Work.

The Clackamas Southern has ordered the first shipment of rails to be laid between Oregon City and Beaver Creek, and it is expected the ties will be ready for work as soon as they arrive. Work is now under way on the long trestle from the Southern Pacific tracks to the foot of the hill. Later on this trestle will no doubt be filled in with the best of lumber.

Already the company has under consideration a big timber-hauling contract with a timber company in Portland, which owns big tracts of timber along the Clackamas route. This company are a heavy ready for the road an average of 25 cars of logs a day for twenty years, and if the company and timber owners come to an agreement this one contract will guarantee steady work and good income for years.

As we have repeatedly stated, and as you all know without anybody stating it, this railroad is going to do a lot for Clackamas county and Oregon City. That it will go on south to Silverton from Molalla, is but a question of time; that it will clear up the thousands of acres of timber land everywhere, and every log and pound of freight will be brought to Oregon City, the end of the road and below the falls.

Portland, daily growing, will be an everlasting market for everything this road will bring in; the county will be settled up, and it is the Courier's guess that the man who owns stock in this company will find it is worth something.

DEATHS.

The funeral of Charles McCormick of Mt. Pleasant took place Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Baptist church in this city. Rev. S. A. Hayworth conducted the services and preached a very appropriate sermon. Many friends attended the services at the church and at the cemetery. The floral offerings were very beautiful. The interment was in the Mountain View cemetery.

The funeral services of Mrs. Geo. Morse, who died suddenly Saturday morning, after a two days' illness, at her home in Jennings Lodge, were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the residence. Rev. E. Zimmerman of the Methodist church in this city officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Bergstrom of Jennings Lodge. After the services at the home, the remains were taken to the crematorium at Sellwood. Many friends attended the services at the crematorium.

The funeral of William H. Fee was held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Gilbert Kinder of Clackamas Heights, October 7, 1911. Services were conducted by Rev. Eugene Zimmerman, pastor of the Methodist church, at 10 o'clock a. m., interment being in Mountain View cemetery.

Deceased was born in Shelbyville, Indiana, Dec. 6, 1846. His father and mother died when he was a small boy. He is the last son of a large family and is survived by only two sisters, Mrs. Mary Eskew of Riverton, Iowa, and Mrs. Ellen Clark of Moreland, Oklahoma; two daughters, Mrs. M. E. Usher of Sellwood, Oregon, and Mrs. A. G. Kinder of Clackamas Heights.

He was an old war veteran, enlisting as a private in Co. G, Third Regiment, Colorado Volunteers, Infantry and Co. F, Second Regiment, Colorado Volunteers, cavalry. He served through the entire war. He has been a resident of Clackamas Falls, Oregon, for the past 25 years, being an old stage driver and freighter until last February. His health failing, he went to the soldiers' home at Roseburg, where he remained until the 9th of August. He came to his daughter's home in Clackamas Heights, where he took to his bed the fourteenth day of August and remained until his death, October 5, at 6 o'clock p. m.

Both of his daughters were at his bedside, also a niece, Mrs. Luella Thornton of Junction City. The old soldier acted as pall bearer. The floral tributes were both touching and beautiful.

THINGS ARE DOING.

Central Point Gets in the Good Roads Swim.

Central Point held a lively good roads meeting Wednesday night and there was all kinds of interest and enthusiasm in the proposed east side capital highway.

Among those who made talks were Judge Hayes, Judge Dimick, A. N. Willis, S. C. Dillman, Dr. L. A. Norris.

Judge Hayes told those who lived along the proposed route that they should look at the matter of the money they will be called upon to put up as an investment, not a donation, as it would come back to them more than doubled in the medium of improved property values.

Judge Dimick declared that the commission had not decided upon a route. He said a map would be made of the proposed routes, and a report would be made to the legislature regarding the subscriptions promised in various localities. He declared that an experienced supervisor should be chosen and retained.

A. N. Willis of Sellwood said that good roads trebled the land values, and the thrift of communities was judged by their highways. He said it would take much money to build the highway and that the land owners who would be benefited should help to pay for it.

Diamonds in This County

Half the population of Estacada is digging for diamonds, and the sewers are being dug up in the hunt.

Mrs. J. W. Hawkins had a half dozen diamond rings tied up in a handkerchief for safety, and in some manner the package fell into an open sink and started down the sewer for the Clackamas river.
