12 DIE, 20 HURT IN TRAIN WECK

Odessa, Minn.-Twelve are dead and a score or more seriously injured as the result of a collision between a silk train on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road, running as section No. 2 of the "Columbian" flyer, from the Pacific Coast, and the rear sleeper of the flyer at the station here

The engine of the silk special plowed five feet into the sleeper, the last car of the flyer, but the greatest loss. of life was in the front end of the sleeper, which was telescoped by the dining-car just ahead.

Although both the diner and the sleeper were of steel, the former sheared the upper portion of the sleeper from the floor as if it had been cardboard. In the impact the diner's floor became elevated slight ly above that of the sleeper's and with the force of section No. 2's engine behind, the sleeper was jammed along for fully 25 feet, while the diner as a gigantic knife cut away the up per structure.


