The Way a County Farmer Sees Some

Their Workings. Legally the position of the farmer is about the same as a blind ox in a logging camp or a hound pup in a city council. His property must be surveyed, deeded and properly located and the report properly recorded at his expense and its value must be ascertained and placed in another set of books so the tax collector can not miss it.
