MATTERS BEFORE COUNCIL

Market Inspector, Liquor License Applications and Other Matters

The draft of the Woman's Club market inspector ordinance was presented to the council Wednesday night. It provides that meat markets and stores must be cleaned once a week; bread and pastry be wrapped and wrapper unbroken at time of sale; fish to be kept on ice and enclosed in glass display cases; markets to have screen doors; milk dairies to be cleaned twice a day, and standards established as to quality; provisions and market articles in stores to be kept from dirt, and many other provisions in favor of eater.

A new garbage can ordinance to take the place of one defeated recently, was also introduced. It provides that all garbage shall be kept in a tight receptacle, which shall be emptied at least once a week.

Plans for changing the grade of High street, between Third and First streets were allowed.

Applications of Anton Kiracher for a liquor license at 207 Eighth street, was referred to the license committee as were the applications of Davis & Lovin and Reckner & Cole for the refunding of \$110.26 for the unexpired part of their license fees, following the revocation of their licenses. Claus Krohn asked permission to transfer his saloon from Seventh street and Railroad avenue to the building formerly occupied by D. M. Klensen on Main street between Fourth & Fifth.

The street committee was empowered to enter into a contract with the Oregon Road Oiling company for oiling the streets at a rate of \$40 per mile. A bid of the Pacific Road Oiling company for \$43.75 per mile, was turned down.


