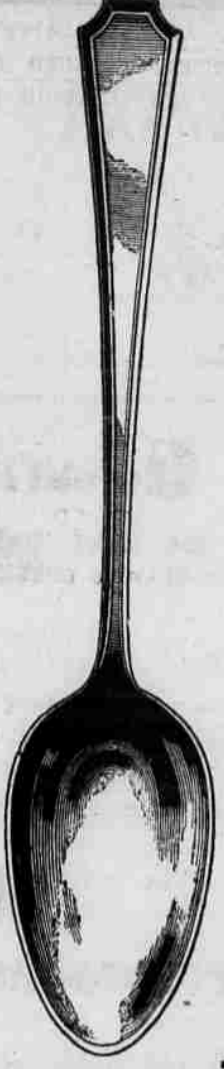

CONEMAK EXPLAINS Resolutions Passed Regarding the District Money Held Up

Whereas, charges have been made against the County Court by George M. Lazelle, a citizen of Clackamas County, residing on the south end road from Oregon City, wherein the said Lazelle states: "That a six mill special tax, levied by road district No. 15, for the purpose of building roads in said district and raising a fund of about \$2700.00 is partly being retained by the County Court without just cause and contrary to wishes of those who paid the tax," and

Whereas, the members of the Canemah Progressive League have personal knowledge of the facts in the matter of the charges made by Lazelle regarding the road funds for Road District No. 15, and that the actual facts are as follows:

That at a road meeting duly called and held on the 22nd day of November, 1911, in Canemah and attended by Lazelle the following resolution was offered and carried:

"RESOLVED, that we do now vote and levy a special tax of six mills on the dollar on all the taxable real and personal property within Road District Number Fifteen (15) Clackamas County, Oregon, for the purpose of improving the county roads within said district with crushed rock, laid thereon in a thorough and business-like manner, to the standard width, the description of said roads and the initial and terminal points of said roads between which said improvements are to be made and the estimated cost of improvements on each are as follows:—

1. The river road commonly called the Canemah Road from the North boundary of Canemah, Clackamas County, Oregon, to Fly Creek, estimated cost Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00).

2. The South End Road from Wm McCord's store southerly to end of said Road District Number Fifteen (15) Clackamas County, Oregon, estimated cost Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00).

3. The Central Point or Kellogg Road from south east corner of the Mt. Pleasant School playground to top of McCord Hill, estimated cost nine hundred (\$900.00).

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the levy hereby made shall be based upon the valuation of the taxable property of said road district Number Fifteen (15) as shown by the last certificate of the County Clerk next preceding this meeting."

That for many years nearly all of the road money from the Canemah Road District has been spent upon the South End Road and other roads and only a few dollars in Canemah and upon the Canemah Road. That this special tax of six mills produced a fund of about \$2700.00 and in accordance with the resolution each road would be entitled to about \$900.

That the citizens of Canemah had been for sometime negotiating with the Portland Railway Light and Power Company, upon the question of improving Main Street therein, upon a portion of which street the track of the Railway Company was located. That during the pendency of such negotiations was that the street car track was removed and the full width of the road or street is now being improved at the expense of the Railway Company.

That the funds on hand of about \$1375, the South End or Lazelle's road has received all of its \$900, with the exception of about \$35, the Canemah Road is entitled to the full amount of her unexpended portion of \$900, the balance belongs to the McCord Road.

That the money expended for road purposes in the said district has been intelligently spent and properly accounted for.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we severally censure the action of George Lazelle, in making such baseless charges against the county court, and of the so-called mass meeting committee, consisting of M. J. Brown, Chairman; R. Schuebel, Secretary; and S. L. Casto, who had questioned several of our citizens and also the Chairman and Secretary of the road meeting, and were in possession of the facts, in submitting a misleading report in relation thereto, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we deplore any action upon the part of some of the citizens of our county to cause the taxpayers to assume and pay the sum of \$3000.00 or more covering the expenses of a recall election, based as the charges evidently are, upon erroneous and misleading statements and reports, similar to the statement and report concerning the Canemah Road Matter, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we express our confidence in the integrity and business ability of the members of the County Court; R. B. Matson, Judge; N. Blair and W. H. Matson, County Commissioners, and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution duly certified by the Secretary of this meeting be forwarded to the newspapers of Clackamas County, especially to the Oregon City Courier, State of Oregon, County of Clackamas, SS.

I hereby certify that I was Secretary of a regular meeting of the Canemah Progressive League, duly called and held on the 3rd day of June, 1913 and that at said meeting the foregoing resolution was unanimously ratified.
