GUILTY OF PERJURY

Circuit Court Jury Finds C. W. Carothers Gave False Evidence The case of C. W. Carothers, under dictment for perjury, has attracted considerable interest at the circuit court, and Wednesday night the jury brought in a verdict of guilty, with a recommend for mercy. Judge Camp-bell will pronounce sentence later.

The indictment was the outcome of a gambling affair. Clarence Miller was one of the participants, and he pleaded guilty and was fined \$25. Before the grand jury Carothers testified that he knew nothing of the af-fair; that he did not know Miller was there, and had never been in a game where Miller had part.

The grand jury returned an indict-ment because of this evidence, and the trial jury brought in a verdict of guilty of perjury.






