HANDSOME CITY HOMES

One of the most attractive homes that has just been completed in Oregon City, is that of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Naterlin on Fourteenth and Madison Street. The residence, which is built on the land recently purchased by Mr. Naterlin, commands an excellent view of the northern part of the city and for many miles distant.

The living room, with its polished floor and beamed ceiling, is 16x14 ft. In this room is a large fireplace of green pressed brick, with rugs to match. On each side are built-in cozy corners. Opening into the room by means of an archway is the dining room of same dimensions, and also having polished floors and beamed ceiling.

At the rear of the living room is a large, airy sleeping apartment and opening into this room is the bath room finished in white enamel. The hangings of the rooms of the first floor are of rare lace, brought by Mr. and Mrs. Naterlin from Europe at the time of their coming to Oregon City to make their future home.

The electric light fixtures throughout the house are of the latest design. In the living room the cluster of lights represent lilies, while those of the dining room and of the sleeping apartment adjoining the living room, tulips.
