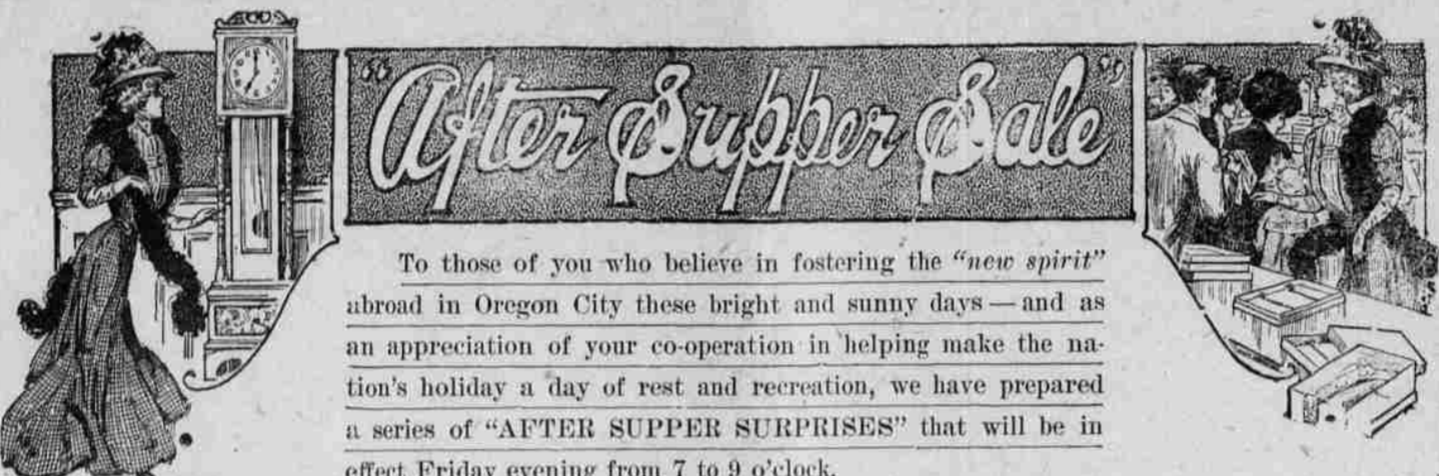

MARGARET L. LITTLE
Mrs. Margaret Little, wife of Walter L. Little, and a prominent resident of this city, being of a well known Oregon pioneer family, died at the family residence on Seventh and Washington street Saturday morning at 8 o'clock, after an illness of two weeks of typhoid fever.

Mrs. Little was born in Oregon City August 25, 1858, and was the daughter of Michael and Elizabeth Summers, prominent Oregon pioneers. She spent her girlhood days in Oregon City, attending the Oregon City schools. She married Walter L. Little of this city 18 years ago. Mrs. Little had a host of friends in Oregon City, and her death came as a sudden shock to her family and many friends. She was a member of St. John's Catholic church, having united with that denomination when a child.

She is survived by her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Summers, of this city; her husband, Walter L. Little, a well known merchant of this city; three sisters, Mrs. John Leary, of Portland, Mrs. Charles Crossman, of Tacoma, Wash., Mrs. Kate McNamara, of Oregon City; two brothers, Peter Summers, of Oregon City, James Summers, of Antelope, Ore. Her father died many years ago in Oregon City.

The funeral services, which were largely attended, were held on Monday morning at 9 o'clock at St. John's Catholic church. Rev. A. Hillbrand, officiating. The interment was in the Catholic cemetery. The pallbearers were E. G. Caufield, Charles W. Kelly, D. E. Frost, L. Ruonich, W. H. Howell, T. P. Randall. The floral tributes were magnificent and in profusion, a token of high esteem in which the deceased was held by all who knew her.
