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The best cure for feather eating hens is to put them in potpies. Handed in this way they give no more trouble.

It is the verdict of those who have tasted it that a roast of Argentine beef is distinctly inferior to a roast from a North American corn belt steer.

Although corn was the last cereal to be generally cultivated, it is now grown more extensively than any other, with the exception of wheat.

Along about now it is hard to beat for relish a dish of dandelion greens cooked with a piece of tender salt pork or ham. The human system seems to crave the tonic which these weeds contain.

One of the great trials of the coaxing spring days is that a fellow cannot be busy from daylight to dark in three or four places at once. Most any of us could lay out work for three or four folks to do.

Every fly killed now means, according to the figures of statisticians, all the way from one to five million flies next September. Early swatting of the pests would seem to indicate an economy of effort.

Notwithstanding the plain need of smaller farms and a more intensive type of agriculture, the census reports seem to indicate that the average size of farms in the country is on the increase rather than decrease.

When land is plowed too wet it is often put in a physical condition which is not righted for years. Soil plowed in this condition becomes puddled or packed together, bakes when it dries and becomes lumpy and hard.

The average stallion owner is on to the psychological effect of contrast, for it is usually a pretty small pony he uses in taking him about. Then, too, the pony may look smaller than he really is in contrast to so large a horse.

It is hard to realize the fact when the little tree is set out, but a hard maple should have not less than forty to fifty feet in which to develop laterally, while an elm should not have less than sixty or seventy feet if it is to be symmetrical at maturity.

The fact that water sparkles and tastes good is no guide at all in determining its freedom from chemical impurities or disease germs. Where cesspools or other sources of contamination are near the well and the subsoil is in any degree porous there is good reason for suspecting a contamination of the water supply.

Salvia makes a most desirable bedding plant, both from the standpoint of their bright, showy blossoms and the richness and luxuriance of foliage. The bed in which the plants are set should be well manured and should be given frequent cultivation. The plants should be given plenty of room in which to grow.

Once in awhile a little time can be gained by planting different kinds of vegetables ahead of their season, but usually it doesn't pay. This holds particularly of beans and other vegetables that require warm weather for their proper development. Early planting often results in stunting rather than early development.

Figures compiled for the year 1900 showed that the average consumption of meat in the United States was 172 pounds per capita. The consumption at the present time is put at about ten pounds per capita less. In Australia and Argentina, where meat is very cheap, its consumption is placed at 250 pounds per capita yearly. In England the figures are 120 pounds annually.

Clean cultivation and rotation of crops are among the best insecticides for practical use. Insects of all kinds thrive best when left alone and are hard put to it when the soil is frequently cultivated. Rotation is a help because of the fact that insects that thrive on one crop may not do well on some other crop used in the rotation. And working a rotation keeps 'em guessing.

While the May and early June pasture is usually luxuriant, it does not contain a large per cent of nutritive elements, being mostly water. For this reason it is well to supplement the pasture with other feed, especially in the case of cows that are in full milk. A mixture of two parts of cotyledon meal, one part of cornmeal and one part of bran is a good combination, the amount fed depending somewhat upon the abundance of the pasture, size of cow and amount of milk given.
