MANY SPECIAL TRAINS

Shriners En Route to Seattle Will Travel in Luxurious Comfort

Coming from every part of the country, 100,000 nobles and families of the Mystic Shrine will begin their pilgrimage late this month or early in July to the oasis of Seattle, where they will participate in the forty-first Imperial Council session.

Because of the many sights which the Shriners wish to take in while on their journey to the Northwest, many of the temples will leave home several weeks before the opening date of the convention. In their special trains they will assemble at Seattle and after the meeting is over, will distribute to every corner of the West.

A total of 150 special trains is expected. Fourteen special trains from the south will pour through Oregon City, Centralia, Chehalis and Tacoma, bringing the Oregon, California and Southwest temples to the meeting. Thirty specials will travel practically in one solid string from St. Paul westward, stopping at Spokane and crossing the Cascades by various routes.

One compact group of fourteen specials will act as escort for the Imperial Potentate from Spokane to Seattle Monday, July 12, comprising the most magnificent escort ever given a citizen in this state. The assemblage of the escort will take place in Spokane, the trains leaving one after another in solid array.

After the council meeting, the specials will either take their hordes south to California, stopping at Tacoma and Oregon points, or will go through Everett, Bellingham and other points and going East via the Canadian Rockies.

Huge Wireless Planned

The Navy Department is planning to construct a new high-power radio station on Puget Sound, probably at Keyport, near Bremerton, Wash. The plant will be one of the most modern stations ever built, and will have towers 400 feet high. It is also reported that another wireless station will be erected on the Copper River flats at Cordova, Alaska.

PARENTS FOR CENSORS

Magazine Suggests Sane and Easy Way to Watch "Movie" Morals

In its July issue the Woman's Home Companion continues its campaign for better moving pictures. A number of films are especially recommended to readers as being thoroughly clean, wholesome and genuinely interesting.

The editor of the department comments in part as follows on the responsibility of parents to investigate for themselves if they want their children to see good movies. "Censorship really belongs to parents instead of to paid officers. Parents are too prone to evade responsibility for children's wrongdoing, really due to the lack of home training, and prefer to shift it upon schools, churches and boards of censorship."

"The training you are giving your children should more than balance any harm done by the films. Keep in mind that films are not the only source of contamination. Well bound books may contain more insidiously harmful influences. Undesirable playmates are another uncensored source."

"In your case, the best thing to do is to find out what theatre handles, on the whole, the most desirable films, and let the children attend that one exclusively. The problem, after all, comes down to this: it must be made profitable for an exhibitor to show good pictures. From his standpoint it is a business proposition, not a philanthropic institution."

Detecting Erasures.

If paper upon which erasures of writing have been made is exposed to the vapor of iodine the roughened surface takes a different tint from that portion which has not been tampered with. If the erasure has been lightly made, only the ink or pencil lead being rubbed away and the mark left in the fiber of the paper, iodine vapor causes the writing to reappear. This is because wherever the paper has been roughened more iodine is absorbed than by a smooth surface. This test is effective within three minutes after the making of the alteration-Exchange.

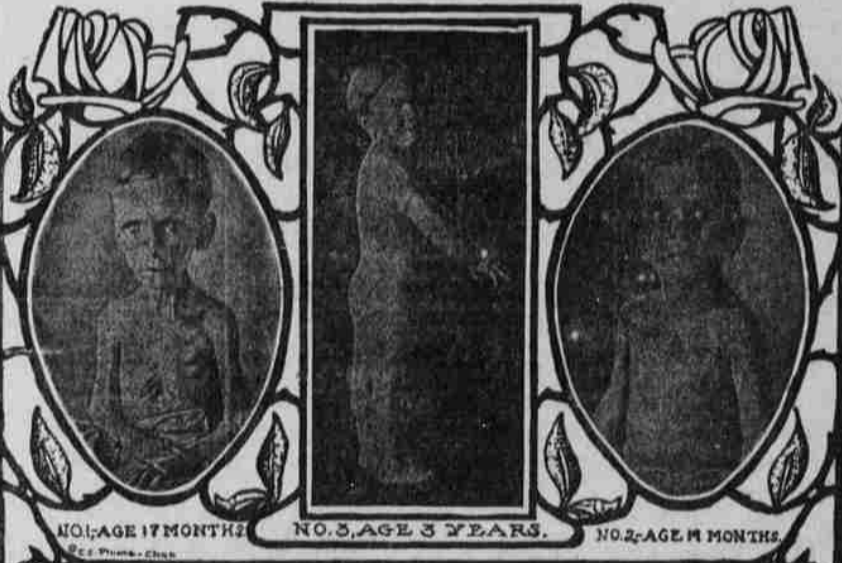
